



Time For Middle-Schoolers To Sign Up For Trout Camp!

Fly fishing for trout in the Great Smoky Mountains is the focus of the eighth annual Great Smoky Mountains Trout Adventure Camp for middle school girls and boys, sponsored by the Tennessee Council of Trout Unlimited. Registration is open now for this year's camp, to be held June 18th-23rd at the Great Smoky Mountains Institute at Tremont in Great Smoky Mountains National Park.



Trout Camp is designed to give campers an appreciation of conservation of our aquatic resources through the sport of fly fishing. Participants learn about stream ecology, stream physics and water chemistry along with aquatic entomology and diversity of fish species in Smokies streams. Experienced mountain anglers teach the campers fly casting, fly tying, stream etiquette and knot tying, and guide them on fishing expeditions to streams in and near the national park. Other activities include swimming and snorkeling in Little River.

Great Smoky Mountains Institute at Tremont is a private, nonprofit environmental learning center on the Middle Prong of Little River. Facilities include dining hall, classrooms, outdoor meeting shelters, bookstore/gift shop and full-time professional staff.

Girls and boys who are interested in fishing and science and who will be 12 to 15 years old on June 17, 2018, are eligible to attend the camp—Tennessee residency is not required. Applications are being accepted from Jan. 1 to June 1; selections will begin April 1. Only 14 campers will be accepted, but others can be placed on a waiting list in case selected campers aren't able to attend. For girls to participate, at least two must be accepted.

Campers should be in good physical condition, able to wade in streams and hike to fishing areas. To ensure physical capabilities, campers must have had a complete physical examination within the past two years.

Tuition for the 2018 camp is \$530. Financial assistance may be available through a camper's area Trout Unlimited chapter—contact information for TU chapters in Tennessee is available on the Tennessee Council website, http://tctu.org/index.html.





Items you need to bring to the VITA Site to have your tax returns prepared

- Proof of identification
- Health Insurance information
- Social Security Cards for you, your spouse and dependents and/or a Social Security Number verification letter issued by the Social Security
- Birth dates for you, your spouse and dependents on the tax return
- Current year's tax package if you received one
- Wage and earning statement(s) Form W-2, W-2G, 1099-R, from all
- Interest and dividend statements from banks (Forms 1099)
- A copy of last year's Federal and State returns if available
- Bank Routing Numbers and Account Numbers for Direct Deposit
- Total paid for day care provider and the day care provider's tax identifying number (the provider's Social Security Number or the provider's business
- To file taxes electronically on a married filing joint tax return, both spouses must be present to sign the required forms.
- It is extremely important that each person use the correct Social Security Number (SSN). The most accurate information is usually located on your original Social Security card.

Clinton Public Library Has Changes Angler's Cure For Winter Blues: Coming for the New Year! Fly Tying Demos and Classes Fly Tying Demos and Classes

With the onset of winter weather, a trout angler's thoughts turn to fly tying—and the Clinch River Chapter of Trout Unlimited has two special offerings planned to satisfy both beginning and experienced fly tyers.

First is a group fly tying demonstration featuring eight skilled tyers from the chapter. The free, public meeting starts at 7 p.m. on Thursday, Jan. 11, in the parish hall at St. Francis Episcopal Church, 158 W. Norris Road, Norris. Participants can circulate around the room as tyers demonstrate a variety of patterns.

Second is the chapter's six-session Beginning Fly Tying course. Guided one-on-one by experienced instructors, students will tie more than 50 flies as they learn nine different trout fly patterns (all different from the patterns demonstrated Jan. 11) that are effective in area tailwaters and in the mountains. Techniques learned will enable participants to tie many other fly patterns as well.

The course is limited to a maximum of 12 students. Six classes are scheduled for Saturday mornings, 9 to noon, from Jan. 20 through Feb. 24, at St. Francis Episcopal Church.

Cost is \$125 including an illustrated manual, all materials and, for newcomers, a free one-year membership to Trout Unlimited. Tools will be loaned free of charge to students who don't have their own. Class proceeds benefit the Clinch River Chapter's conservation and youth education projects.

lew Tennessee Laws Take Effect in 2018

As we say goodbye to 2017, we will say hello to some new laws. All across the country, hundreds of laws went into effect on January 1st, 2018.

Here are some of the laws impacting Tennessee:

A new free speech law allows students at institutions of higher education to speak about, write about and discuss any topic so long as they do not violate the First Amendment. The bill also forbids these institutions from disinviting speakers on the basis that their presence may be met with criticism or controversy.

Drivers are not permitted to talk on the phone in an active school zone. Hand-free devices are permitted. Violating the new law results in a Class C misdemeanor and up to a \$50 fine.

Barbers can now make home visits to customers who are not ill. Previously, only sick customers could have barbers visit their homes. In order to make a home visit, the barber must have a residential barber certificate.

School bus drivers must now be 25 years old or older (Current drivers younger than 25 will be grandfathered in) and they must complete a training program before they are allowed to transport students.

The firing range requirement to obtain a handgun carry permit no longer applies to active duty military or veterans who have experience in the military police, special operations, or special forces.

16th Annual Coal Creek Scholars Day & Goodies from Santa

The Coal Creek Scholars program began as a dream for an unbroken circle where Briceville students can participate in K-12 community service projects to celebrate their heritage and qualify for college scholarships. In return, they agree to inspire Briceville fourth and fifth graders to continue that tradition.

The unbroken circle was on display today when thirteen college students or graduates from Briceville told this year's fourth and fifth graders the importance of going to college during the 16th annual Coal Creek Scholars Day event. Casey Swindall, Frances-Lee Dougherty, and Kyle Leinart told how their college degrees have enabled them to own their own businesses, thus helping them live the American Dream.

Jessica Haves McKinney told how she used her Coal Creek scholarship to go to East Tennessee State University—she is now the fifth-grade teacher at Briceville School. Jessica was a fifth-grade student when we first assessed the health of Coal Creek by documenting what lives in it in August 2000 during a visit by Congressman Zach Wamp. The following spring, her class was recognized for documenting Coal Creek history in a Resolution from the Tennessee Senate. She qualified for her scholarship by conducting research to assist Dr. Eirug Davies of Harvard University in his book, "The Welsh of Tennessee." As a graduate of Briceville School with a Master's degree in education, she is uniquely qualified for her current position—you can't ask for a better role model than that for Briceville students.

Briceville School's technology teacher Janis Bishop asked scholars if you need to be the smartest in your class to go to college, prompting them to respond in unison, "No." Developing good study habits to earn good grades is important, but so is treating others with respect. When you are applying to college or for a job, you will be asked to provide references. How you treat others will likely be the determining factor in whether you receive a positive or negative recommendation. Disrespectful students will never live the American Dream, regardless of their grades.

Amy Crabtree told how she is able to manage a career and a family as a result of the mutual respect she has with her boss. When she had her second child. Amy went to her boss and asked if an arrangement could be worked out to enable her to work part-time in her job as a therapist, so she could spend more time with her family. Her boss went to bat for her to make it happen due to the trust and respect they share.

After Jonathan Towe described his experience at medical school, a student asked if seeing body parts grossed him out. He said that's the price you pay in saving lives. It's why doctors command such high respect in society.

Peyton Jenkins described how he has always been intrigued with space travel, which is why he is using his Coal Creek scholarship to attend the University of Tennessee to study aeronautical engineering.

Andy Harness described how his degree enables him to provide a valuable service to his community as illustrated by the mini-documentary he produced for the Coal Creek Miners Museum and the video "Celebrating 16 Years with the Coal Creek Watershed Foundation."

Drew Payne and Emily Hayes told how life has a way of throwing you a curve, but that's no excuse for losing sight of your goal to finish college. Having to take time off from college makes you appreciate the advantages of life with a college degree.

Over \$400,000 has been invested in college scholarships to help 48 Coal Creek Scholars from Briceville go to college. Coal Creek Scholars are current and future nurses, engineers, doctors, teachers, therapists, scientists, lawyers, business leaders, business owners, as well as medical/computer/artistic specialists. Scholars in attendance today included Amy (Dugger) Crabtree, Casey (Prosise) Swindall, Frances-Lee (Braden) Dougherty, Andy Harness, Jessica (Hayes) McKinney, Phillip Smith, Kyle Leinart, Jonathan Towe, Emily (Patton) Hayes, Drew Payne, Peyton Jenkins, Anna Braden, and Katie Tidwell.

Briceville students touched our hearts today by presenting us with a HUGE Christmas card signed by each student at the school.

Afterwards, the Coal Creek Scholars served as Santa's helpers in delivering toys to all the good little boys and girls at Briceville
