
ARBOR DAY CELEBRATION The City of Rocky Top held its



ROCKY TOP PUBLIC LIBRARY **NEWS & EVENTS**

On Saturday, March 21 st the Rocky Top Public Library was closed to the public until further notice due to community health concerns surrounding the COVID-19 virus and recommendations from the CDC (Center Disease Control). We are now offering a no contact Curbside Pickup service.

To use the curbside pickup service please follow these procedures:

Call the library and request books or reserve on-line.

Staff will call letting you know when items are available for pick up.

If you have items to return, please place them in the drop box in front of the library (we will not accept any materials at the door).

Have library card ready to show upon arrival (through the glass door).

Park in the front and call the library when you arrive.

Stay in your vehicle until a box with your materials are set outside the door in a bag with your name and library card number on them.

Come to door and show your library card to staff member through the glass door, pickup your materials and leave.

We ask that you don't ask to come in as that will not be permitted during this time of closure. Please do all correspondence by telephone or email. We will not be able to answer any questions at the door.

If anyone in your household is ill, please refrain from returning books or utilizing the curbside service.

We will not charge fines or fees during this time of closure. All materials will have a month long due date. ALL materials may be returned in the drop box in the front of the library.

If you need internet service, our public WIFI will be available from our parking lot during regular business hours. You may log in to our website at rockytoppubliclibrary.com for other services that are available.

Please check out the Libby app through your device's app store for thousands of free eBooks and audiobooks.

Due to all programs being canceled until further notice we are providing Storytime, STEAM projects, Craft Classes and lots of other information on our Facebook and website. Don't forget to check us out!



We will start scheduling appointments beginning January 27th. To make an appointment you may call the library @ 865-426-6762.

Trained volunteers can help you with special credits, such as Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC), Child Tax Credit, and Credit for the Elderly for which you may qualify. In addition to FREE tax return (preparation assistance, the Rocky Top Public Library site also offers free electronic filing (e-filing).

Items you need to bring to the VITA Site to have your tax returns prepared:

Proof of identification • Health Insurance information • Current year's tax package if you received one • Social Security Cards for you, your spouse and dependents and/or a Social Security Number verification letter issued by the Social Security Administration • Birth dates for you, your spouse and dependents on the tax return • Wage and earning statement(s) Form W-2, W-2G, 1099-R, from all employers

Interest and dividend statements from banks (Forms 1099) • A copy of last year's Federal and State returns if available

• Bank Routing Numbers and Account Numbers for Direct Deposit •

Total paid for day care provider and the day care provider's tax identifying number (the provider's Social Security Number or the provider's business Employer Identification Number) •

To file taxes electronically on a married filing joint tax return, both spouses must be present to sign the required forms. It is extremely important that each person use the correct Social Security Number (SSN).

The most accurate information is usually located on your original Social Security card.

LOOKING FOR SOMETHING TO DO AS A FAMILY? WHY NOT HAVE A BACKYARDCAMPOUT!

Spending time with your children is important for a healthy development of family bonds. With some proper planning, parents can ensure they provide the kids with an all around fun experience. When it comes to planning a memorable family adventure, nothing can come close to the endless fun that kids have when camping outdoors. Here's a few tips to make your campout extra fun!

Set up a Tent or build a fort

Supply the kids with a tent to retreat to with items such as books, stuffed animals and games. A deck of cards and a board game will keep the kids entertained! Other items to put in your play tent include a small table and chairs, coloring books and crayons, building blocks and Play-Dough.

Explore your yard

There are many interesting and educational things that can be found around the yard. Go on an "exploration" of the area to discover the many different types of insects, plants, flowers and trees in the yard. An age appropriate book on birds, insects, plants or animals will surely excite any tiny explorer. A magnifying glass or binoculars are sure to add an element of fun to your adventure.

Organize a treasure hunt

It is important to plan ahead for activities such as this one. Create a treasure hunt for the children with clues that will lead them around the yard and to a final payoff. Each clue can be geared to a nature reference, family activity reference (swing set, garage, flowerbed, etc.), or possibly as a treasure map complete with numbered paces, geographical direction and an "X" to mark the spot! You can download treasure maps from the Internet as well.

Get Active

Arrange some physical playtime to burn off energy with activities such as badminton, volleyball, soccer, Frisbee or touch football. For extremely hot days, consider playing some less strenuous competitions such as beanbag toss or croquet. If there are enough participants, devise a small tournament of players competing for prizes. Hot days are an opportunity to enjoy water balloons or water gun fights. For a no fail, bubbles and water balloons are always a winner with children of all ages.

Cook Outside

Great chefs know that there is no substitute for cooking over an open flame. Plan the family meal to include items that can be cooked over a fire, such as hot dogs, chili, beans or any other family favorite. After the food has been cleaned off the plates, it is time for the sticky sweetness that only S'mores can bring to a campfire.

Sing Campfire Songs

An acoustic guitar, harmonica or kazoo can turn any campfire into a small choir of outdoor enthusiasts. Choose familiar songs for the younger children to join in, like "Oh Suzanna" or "I've Been Workin' on the Railroad." Take the opportunity to teach the kids some new songs or engage the family in making up your own catchy tunes.



Go stargazing

Enjoy the night sky with activities with your children. While the little kids have fun counting the stars and drawing the constellations they see, older kids can identify those constellations by using a star guide. Have the kids draw the shapes they see in the sky and create their own constellations. They can invent some background stories of their creation, which will surely engage conversation.

Talk about what they see in the sky such as the moon, airplanes, planets or shooting stars while lying comfortably in your own backyard.

Tell Campfire Stories

When it is time to settle down and prepare for slumber, engage the family around the fire with some campfire stories. For older kids, these stories can be scary ones told with the addition of the theatrics created with a flashlight shining under your chin. If your kids are younger, you can tell a story in which each person around the campfire adds some content to the fable as you go around the circle. Allow a certain amount of speaking time for each person or number of words that can be added to the circle story for added fun. Encourage children to make up their own stories and tell them to the group.
