Love The Clinch River? Sign Up For The Big Clinch River Cleanup

Registration is open now for everyone who wants to help with the fifth annual Big Clinch River Cleanup on Saturday, July 22nd. It starts at 8:00 a.m. with breakfast at the scenic Museum of Appalachia, 2819 Andersonville Highway, Norris. The cleanup will wrap up about 2:00 p.m.

Everyone who enjoys the river, from anglers to kayakers to wildlife watchers, is invited to help remove litter from the Clinch and its banks. The community wide cleanup is an expansion of annual pickups run for many years by members of the Clinch River Chapter, Trout Unlimited, which hosts the event. Last year, 110 volunteers from 34 ZIP codes gathered tires and trash from the river.

Volunteers work in a variety of ways:

- * Above the water line, workers walk along riverside roads and through parking areas, gathering trash.
- * Volunteers wearing waders patrol for litter in shallow water.
- * In kayaks and canoes, volunteers work to clean shorelines and shallow water where there is no public access by road.
- * In powerboats, volunteers haul tires and other large items from the depths.

Support for all the teams is supplied by volunteering emergency medical people, ham radio operators, tire disposal professionals and workers with trucks who collect and dispose of filled trash bags.

This year, the first 100 volunteers to register will qualify for a free full breakfast at the picturesque museum (expenses of the meal are supported by a grant from the Tennessee Valley Authority). The event will be held rain or shine (in case of severe weather, the breakfast will be held but volunteers will stay on shore).

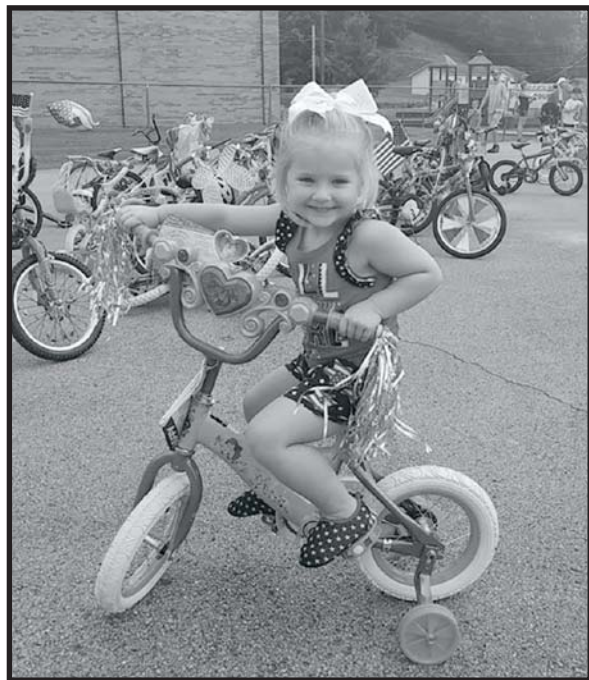

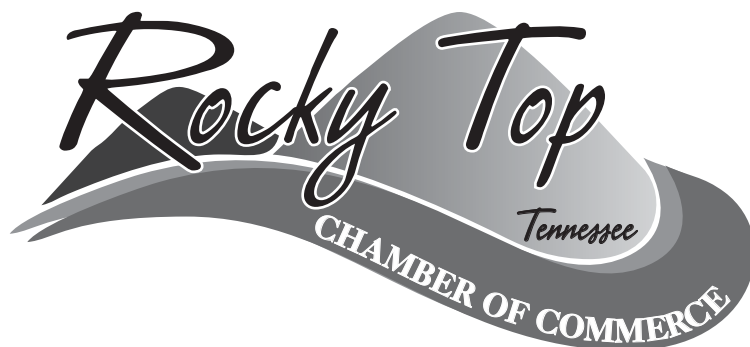

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Coal Creek History Comes to Life for Briceville School 4th & 5th Graders — Honoring the Miners of Fraterville on the 115th Anniversary of the Explosion

May 19th, 1902, started out like most days in the coal fields of East Tennessee. Wives of Fraterville miners such as Edith McKamey, Serepta Sharp, Mary Adkins, Ellen Vowell, and Josie Harmon fixed breakfast to get their husbands off to work and their children off to school or work. Catherine Dezern's husband had died in a logging accident a decade earlier, but she fixed a hot breakfast for her three unmarried sons, Carl, Samuel, and George—her daughters-in-law Minnie and Lula did likewise for her sons John and David.

While most of the Fraterville miners started the day with their families that morning, 32 of them ate at boarding houses or fended for themselves. They were itinerant workers, who traveled from mine to mine to get short-term work.

All those lives changed at 7:20 that morning, when the Great Fraterville Mine exploded. Rescue crews searched valiantly for survivors, but none were found. It was the worst disaster in the history of mining in the South where 216 men and boys died on May 19, 1902. Many of them were veterans of the Coal Creek War in which miners had fought the Tennessee National Guard to abolish convict leasing in Tennessee.

Students from Briceville's fourth and fifth grade classes learned about them on their 17th-annual history field trip, which started at the make-shift cemetery where Fraterville itinerant miners were buried adjacent to the old Fraterville railroad spur. Stories about the Fraterville miners were told by living historian David R. Thomas, the Welsh miner/engineer who was born in Carmarthen, South Wales in 1839.

Mr. Thomas told how he came to Coal Creek after the American Civil War as part of a contingent of Welsh miners who developed a coal mine to fuel the mills of the Knoxville Iron Company. He lost his job to convict labor in 1877, but found work in the Fraterville Mine where he later became an apprentice to engineer C. G. Popp, which qualified him for his job as an engineer with the Provident Insurance Company.

At the abandoned Fraterville Mine portal, students heard how Major E. C. Camp opened the Fraterville Mine in 1870 and it had the reputation of being one of the safest mines in the state. The name of the mine and surrounding town means, "Village of Brothers." Major Camp recruited experienced miners and encouraged them to bring their friends and relatives to work in the mine with them.

Thomas told how he was on the rescue crew that found where 26 miners had barricaded themselves into a room of the mine awaiting rescue, but had suffocated before help arrived. Ten of those miners wrote farewell letters to their families before suffocating. All the letters had two common topics—God and family—which tells you all you need to know about life's priorities in 1902.

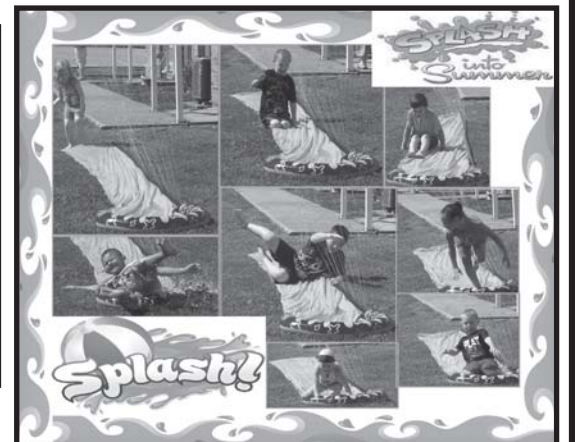

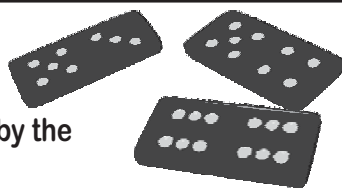

Join us on Monday, July 10th and 31st at 11:00 a.m. for a game of Dominos, Yahtzee or your favorite card game. Games are provided by the library.



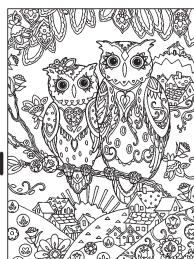
LEGO Club - All Ages

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Proper Medicine Disposal Bin Update

Walgreens Pharmacy in Oak Ridge now has a permanent medication disposal bin to serve the community. Five permanent disposal bins already exist throughout Anderson County at local police departments. Medication disposal has been a collaborative community effort and citizens have taken advantage of the service.

Since 2010, ASAP of Anderson County, along with Oak Ridge Police Department, Clinton Police Department, Oliver Springs Police Department, Rocky Top Police Department, and Norris Police Department have worked together to provide this service. Since its inception, more than 6,500 pounds of medication have been disposed through Operation Rx. All agencies are excited that Walgreens in Oak Ridge is now a participating partner, focused on enhancing access to proper medication disposal.

Chief James Akagi of ORPD said “having a second disposal bin at Walgreens will help immensely in reducing the burden on the department, as it offers another opportunity for residents of Oak Ridge to responsibly dispose of their unused medication.” ORPD hopes having a second bin located in Oak Ridge will take some of the traffic from their bin. In recent months, the bin has been temporarily locked due to max capacity. They have been accumulating unwanted medicine in their bin faster than the mechanism for it being destroyed allows.

The medication disposal bin at Walgreens is located at 1229 Oak Ridge Turnpike in Oak Ridge, Tennessee. The bin stands inside the store in the pharmacy section: Walgreens Pharmacy is open 24/7. Pharmacy manager Saad Aqqad encourages community members to properly and safely dispose of their unused medication and monitor the medication in their home.

Medications approved for disposal include prescription medications (schedule II-V controlled and non-controlled substances) as well as over-the-counter medications. Manager Aqqad said, “we hope to reduce access to prescription drugs by helping our community dispose of their medication safely.” Safe disposal of your medicines properly will ensure that they will not be stolen from your garbage, will not enter our environment, and eliminates the potential for abuse and overdoses at home.

ASAP commends Walgreens Pharmacy for their local prevention efforts, as well as our local Police Departments for their dedication maintaining medicine disposal bins.

Free Event Teaches Women The Basics Of Fly Fishing

NORRIS—Women on the Water, a free special event for women who want to learn fly fishing, will be Saturday, September 23rd, 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., hosted by the Clinch River Chapter of Trout Unlimited.

The women's event, partly funded by a grant from the Tennessee Valley Authority, is part of the celebration of National Public Lands Day. It will take place at Miller Island Public Access Area on the Clinch.

Participants will receive instruction in fly casting, fly tying, knot tying, water safety and the insects eaten by trout; from noon to 3:00 p.m., women will wade the river and fish with volunteer guides. It's all free, lunch will be included and fishing equipment will be available for students who don't have their own.
