Lake City Christmas Parade

The Lake City parade will be Friday, December 6, 2013 and the theme is A Christmas to Remember. The parade will start at 7 p.m. and registration will be from 5 to 6:45 p.m. Please be aware that everyone participating in the parade must register, sign a release and receive a number

regardless if you want to be judged or not. If you do not register and receive a number, you will be asked to leave the parade line.

The biggest change this year is where participants will be registering for the parade. If you are driving a classic or antique car in the parade, you will need to



park at Lake City Internal Medicine, adjacent to the Lake City Middle School on Industrial Park Road. You will also register at that location. Drivers will need to back their cars into one of the spaces provided while waiting for the parade to start.

Emergency vehicles will line up on Industrial Park Road. Industrial Park Road to Hustler Boat Lane will be closed at 5 p.m. until all parade participants leave the area.

If you plan on participating in the parade with an all terrain vehicle, the driver must be 16 years of age or older and you will register at the Lake City Middle School.

If you are sponsoring a float or a group, you must also register at the Lake City Middle School. Only one person representing the float or group has to fill out the registration but please be aware that you are releasing liability for everyone participating in your group or on your float.

All floats and everyone participating with floats must be lined up

Rocky Top vs. Lake City

To be or not to be Rocky Top, that is the question that Lake City residents are asking.

Lake City Council members will be voting on November 7, 2013 at 5 p.m. on whether or not to change the name of Lake City to Rocky Top.

City council conducted a public meeting on Friday, November 1st where residents were able to voice their opinion about the name change and the proposed development of several attractions throughout the Lake City area.

To a standing room only crowd at Main Street Baptist Church, Brad Coriell, the animator for the newly formed Rocky Top Manufacturing and Marketing, presented plans for what the company wants to do when Lake City changes its name.

The first project will be called Knotty Pine and it will be an Interactive 3-D Theater that will cater to children. The plans also include a themed ride that merges riding in coal cars and playing laser tag.

Future phases include a Coal Miners Theater, a water park that can be utilized year round, the Jenny Lee River Boat restaurant, a lodge and a candy store.

Several attendees voiced concerns over the development such as increased traffic, commercializing the area and overshadowing Lake City's history.

However, the majority of the people in attendance agreed with Theresa Brown who said "I would like to see this town develop for better services and for people to have something to do."

Lucy Bates said that "our young people leave Lake City because they can't find jobs; this will give them a reason to stay."

The only question from the audience was how soon the first attraction would open. According to Brad Coriell, the investors are projecting to be opened in eighteen months.

If council votes to change the name at Thursday's meeting, the city will request approval from the state to change the name which could take up to six months.

Anderson County Veterans Day Parade

The 7th Annual Anderson County Veterans Day Parade will be held on Monday, November 11th at 6 p.m. in downtown Clinton. This year's theme is "Showing our County's Veterans - We Care".

The parade will start on Market Street and move towards Main Street, passing by the Anderson County Courthouse.

Immediately following the parade there will be a ceremony Celebrating Veterans featuring a mini-concert by local favorites Russ & Becky Jeffers in the Ritz Theater.

This year's Grand Marshall will be Leon Jaquet, the Director of Veteran Services for Anderson County and the Commander of the Clinton American Legion Post #172. Jaquet is a 24-year retiree of the U.S. Navy prior to moving to Clinton and was selected as the Veteran Service Office in 2007.

All veterans are invited to participate and everyone is encouraged to come out and support our veterans, past, present and future at the wonderful parade.

TAX RELIEF PROGRAM

The City of Lake City administers a state-funded Property Tax Relief Program to help elderly citizens pay their property taxes.

Property owners may be eligible to receive tax relief for the current tax year if they are 65 years old or older, must reside on the property and have a combined annual income of \$27,800 or less for the year 2012.

There are Tax Relief Programs for disabled homeowners and disabled veterans that do not have to meet the age requirements.

Hiking Rock Creek Trail at Norris Dam State Park

Rock Creek Trail is one of my favorite trails. This time of year it offers a colorful show of fall colors and is one of only two trails that lead to Norris Lake from the park.

Rock Creek Trail is approximately 1.2 miles and rated moderate to difficult. Rock Creek Trail is part of the Andrews Ridge Trail System.

Prior to the park being established, families lived on the ridges and hollows that now make up Andrews Ridge. W.T. Lamb, Stella Lamb, and Delis Elkins owned the land that Rock Creek Trail now traverses on.

Rock Creek Trail is accessed from Andrews Ridge Trail. At this time of year the trail is littered with tulip poplar and sassafras leaves. There is a sharp 45 degree turn to the left. In the bend the water tower in the west campground is visible up the hill.

Soon you will reach the Grand Central Station of the Andrews Ridge Trail System; Rock Creek, Sink Hole, and Hootin Hollow Trails meet at this point. On the left are two trailheads for Rock Creek Trail. This write-up takes the second one you reach, across from the trailhead for Sink Hole Trail.

Notice the trail sign, it is blazed orange. The trail immediately begins to slope down. Between the two trailheads for Rock Creek you will see a colossal tree that has fallen; as you begin hiking down the trail you will see the root ball on the left.

Right now the fall colors are stunning. The colorful leaves still clutching onto the branches are like a kaleidoscope, and the crunching of leaves remind me why I love fall.

Do be careful if you hike this trail during the fall; leaves on the trail cover loose rocks, holes, stumps, and deep ditches. You might want to bring a hiking stick to help keep your footing and to find what is lying underneath the leaf litter.

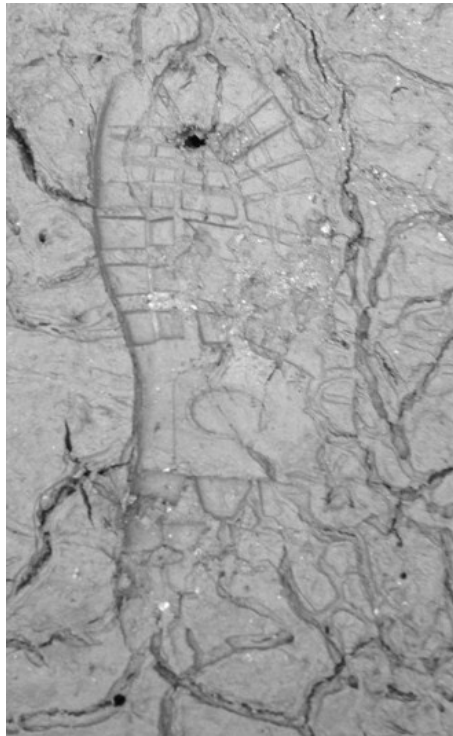
The right banks are covered in moss and lichen. The trail continues to get steeper and sections of the trail are rutted out caused by heavy rainfall and streams during the wet season. Look for dark red dogwood leaves.

The trail flattens out at the bench, but then becomes steeper as you continue down the mountain.

In the spring and early summer months two springs ease out of the rocky ground and form a small creek at the bottom of the mountain. The trail crosses at the meeting of these two springs.

At this point you can continue on the trail and climb back to the top of the mountain or take a side trail to Norris Lake.

Can you identify these tracks?



The trail leading to the lake is not blazed. It is flat and runs parallel to the creek. During the wet season the ground is soggy from the creek crossing the trail several times and small springs that flow down the mountain sides into the creek. You will soon see a bench and just around the bend Norris Lake comes into view.

Once you reach the lake's bank the trail ends. The water level in the lake begins to drop in late August/early September. If you hike it during the winter you will be walking what would be under water during the summer months.

The cove is a great place to explore. Sycamore trees are easy to spot with their shaggy bark and evidence of animals are evident by tracks in the mud. One particular hike I saw dog and raccoon tracks! Take note of how steep the banks are.

Return to the main trail and veer to the right side. On the left you will see how the land has been gouged out over time by running water. You will begin to climb back up the mountain side. It is visible where smaller creeks form larger ones on this portion of the trail. Sugar maples and red oaks are plentiful.

You will cross two small foot bridges. After you cross the second one the trail switch backs to the left. The trail levels out for several yards, gradually climbs, and levels out again.

The trail takes another sharp left at the bench. As you begin to climb the last section the tree canopy opens up allowing sun light in. Be aware of your footing as you look up, it is rutted out.

When you reach the top you are back on Andrews Ridge Trail; turn right to return to your car.

Rock Creek Trail will also be the featured trail for the "First Hike of the Month" series. On the first Saturday of each month there is an interpretive hike.

This month's hike will be on November 2 at 2:00 p.m. Meet Ranger Baghetti at the Andrews Ridge Trail System trailhead, located on the west side below the west campground.

Directions to the trailhead: from 441, turn into the west side of the park; take the first left toward campground/hiking trails; drive approximately 1 mile; the trail maintenance office will be on the right and dump station on the left; park at the trail maintenance office.

Assistance for Senior Citizens

The Anderson County Office on Aging (ACOOA) is funded with money from the Older Americans Act. This funding is utilized to assist those in the County who are age 60 and older with information and assistance pertaining to housing, energy (liHeap), telephone assurance, applications for hearing aids and eye glasses, food and so much more.

The Senior Nutrition Program, nicknamed Meals on Wheels, is operated by the ACOOA. Anyone age 60 years of age and older is eligible to eat at one of the four Anderson County congregate meal sites located at the Norris Garden Apartments, Charles Seivers Towers in Clinton, the Lake City Community Center, and the Oak Ridge Senior Center.

The office also offers a 2nd Harvest Food Bank distribution twice each month for Seniors 60 years of age and older.

The Coordinator of ACOOA, Cherie Phillips, is a

notary public and can notarize important documents. She is also certified to assist with health insurance information.

Over the past few years, Cherie has instituted an "outreach" program whereby she and volunteers go out into the different communities of the County to let people know how her office can be of assistance.

So far, the communities of Fairview, Briceville, Clinton, Devonia, Oak Ridge and Lake City have been visited. Other communities are on the list for 2014.

It is through Cherie's efforts that many seniors in the county have a Christmas basket of gifts and staples. She is also behind the very successful "goody bags" which are given to the seniors who attend Senior Day at the Anderson County Fair.

The Anderson County Council on Aging assists the ACOOA with activities, approves the menu for meals, and helps in identifying needs of seniors in the County.

This Council meets the fourth Tuesday of each month and everyone is encouraged to attend and participate on the council.

Volunteers are always needed for various reasons. Several college students get their community service requirements by assisting.

Donations for the Christmas baskets which go to seniors who are alone and won't have much of a Christmas are also needed.

The ACOOA will be hosting a Christmas Celebration at the Clinton Community Center on December 12, 2013 at 11:30 a.m. Everyone is welcome.

behind the Middle School. The area can be accessed near the gym. If you arrive before 5 p.m., please do not park your float or trailer in front of the school. Pull it around to the back but be aware that school dismisses at 3:10 p.m. and the road behind the school is the car rider pick up route.

If you are participating in a walking group without a float, please meet and wait at the office entrance with the awning at the middle school. 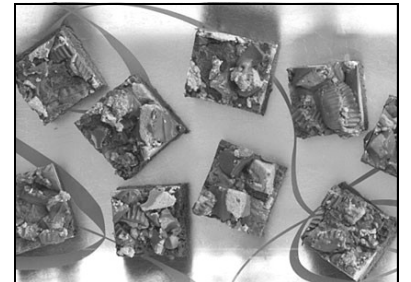
