ASAP Youth Ambassadors Meet with Lt. Governor McNally in Nashville "Feed My Sheep Blessing Box" Community members band together and built a "Blessing Box"

ASAP of Anderson advocates for substance misuse prevention at the State Capitol

Clinton, TN February 2019 - Coalition members, staff, and youth ambassadors from ASAP of Anderson traveled to Nashville, TN this week to join coalitions across the state for Prevention Alliance of Tennessee (PAT) Day on the Hill. ASAP Youth Ambassadors sat down with Lt. Governor Randy McNally to advocate for substance misuse prevention in our community. The students brought up several issues including concerns about electronic nicotine delivery systems (ENDS), tobacco, ketamine, alternative opioid treatments, and medical marijuana Lt. Governor listened intently as each student gave facts and personal accounts to illustrate the effects of these substances and suggested policy improvements to keep themselves, their fellow students and their community safe and healthy. In addition, Youth Ambassadors also expressed their concerns and had their voices heard in meetings with both Representative John Ragan and Representative Dennis Powers. The students strongly advocated for primary prevention of substance misuse in Anderson County and across Tennessee. PAT Day on the Hill is an annual event that coordinates anti-drug coalitions from across Tennessee to educate policy makers on the importance of prevention and how Tennessee's coalitions like ASAP of Anderson are making a difference and showing strong return on investment for primary prevention dollars. In Anderson County, for every dollar spent on primary prevention there is a return of \$17.73. ASAP of Anderson also attended the Anderson County Chamber of Commerce Legislative Dinner on Wednesday evening where we were able to support the Chamber and speak to substance misuse prevention priorities.

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Free Tax Return Preparation Rocky Top Public Library

We will start scheduling appointments beginning January 28th.

To make an appointment you may call the library @ 865-426- 6762.

Trained volunteers can help you with special credits, such as Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC), Child Tax Credit, and Credit for the Elderly for which you may qualify. In addition to FREE tax return preparation assistance, the Rocky Top Public Library site also offers free electronic filing (e-filing).

Items you need to bring to the VITA Site to have your tax returns prepared

Proof of identification • Health Insurance information • Current year's tax package if you received one • Social Security Cards for you, your spouse and dependents and/or a Social Security Number verification letter issued

by the Social Security Administration • Birth dates for you, your spouse and dependents on the tax return • Wage and earning statement(s) Form W-2, W-2G, 1099-R, from all employers

Interest and dividend statements from banks (Forms 1099) • A copy of last year's Federal and State returns if available

Bank Routing Numbers and Account Numbers for Direct Deposit
 Total paid for day care provider and the day care provider's tax identifying number (the provider's Social Security Number or the provider's business Employer Identification Number)

To file taxes electronically on a married filing joint tax return, both spouses must be present to sign the required forms. • It is extremely important that each person use the correct Social Security Number (SSN). ASAP of Anderson Meets with Senators Alexander and Blackburn, Representative Fleischmann in D.C.

ASAP Coalition Members and Staff advocate for substance misuse prevention in Washington D.C.

Clinton, TN February 2019 - Coalition members and staff from ASAP of Anderson traveled to Washington D.C. this week to join over 2,800 substance misuse prevention specialists and advocates from across the country for CADCA's (Community Anti-Drug Coalitions of America's) 29th Annual National Leadership Forum.

On Tuesday, February 5th, the ASAP group attended Tennessee Tuesday, a weekly breakfast hosted by Senator Lamar Alexander and Senator Marsha. Blackburn and their staff. ASAP took this opportunity to advocate for prevention as a priority on the national agenda. Although treatment and recovery services are very important, communities cannot get ahead of the opioid epidemic or any other substance misuse issues without prevention. Prevention is a key component to preventing first use and reducing substance misuse overall in our communities.

Coalition members and staff also met with Representative Chuck Fleischmann and his staff on Wednesday, February 6th for Capitol Hill Day to convey a similar message. On his twitter account @RepChuck, the representative shared his perspective on the meeting saying "A key to preventing substance abuse in #TN03 schools is to ensure our future leaders are privy to conversations about the dangers of abuse & addiction. Today, I thanked members of @ScottCoSTAND & Costant C

In addition to these meetings, ASAP learned about a wide range of topics at the CADCA Forum conference, including hearing from Dr. Jerome M. Adams, the Surgeon General of the United States and the Director of the Office of National Drug Control Policy, Jim Carroll.

ASAP of Anderson's mission is to prevent and reduce substance misuse among youth and adults in Anderson County, and advocacy at the local, state and national levels is a key component of the coalition's strategies for change. ASAP Coalition Members in attendance were Tribby Kelly, Family and Community Engagement Manager at Oak Ridge Schools Preschool; Brandon Pelizzari, Assistant District Attorney General for the State of Tennessee 8 th Judicial District; and Shayla Sanderson, Director of Coordinated School Health for Oak Ridge Schools. ASAP Staff Stephanie Strutner, Executive Director and Jennifer Burnette, Prevention Coordinator, were also in attendance.

Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome, Babies Are Not Born Addicted

Babies exposed to drugs are clinically diagnosed as drug dependent – Why terminology matters

Anderson County, TN, February 2019 – When pregnant women take prescription medications or other drugs, their baby may be born drug-dependent. This is not the same as addiction. Addiction is a chronic disease of the brain characterized by drug seeking behavior and the inability to stop using a drug. Babies with neonatal abstinence syndrome (NAS) experience withdrawal due to drug exposure while in the womb and are clinically diagnosed as drug dependent. This is an important distinction. Dependence is characterized by the physical effects on the body. A baby born with NAS is not exhibiting drug seeking behavior, but instead may suffer from physical withdrawal symptoms such as fever, seizures, blotchy skin, continuous crying, rapid breathing, respiratory problems and extreme sensitivity to sounds and light. Addiction? Dependence? Why does it matter what language we use? The answer: Stigma. The concept of stigma describes the powerful, negative perceptions commonly associated with substance use and dependence. Stigma is a public health issue and can be particularly harmful to pregnant mothers with substance use disorder. People with substance use disorders are often viewed by the public as weak-willed, although evidence shows that they are as likely to adhere to treatment as people with other chronic medical conditions, such as hypertension or diabetes. Substance use disorder is among the most stigmatized conditions in the US and around the world, and in the case of babies born with NAS, pregnant mothers who experience stigma are less likely to seek proper treatment, further compounding the effects of drug use on their unborn child.

Every person can play a critical role in helping overcome this barrier. A simple step to reducing stigma and knocking down these barriers is by using person-first language. Person-first language emphasizes the person, not the disorder, in an attempt to avoid marginalization. This type of language suggests that a person has a problem that can be addressed, rather than implying that the person is the problem. We urge you to use the term "born drug dependent" instead of "born addicted" or "drug addicted babies" when discussing this topic. The well-being of our most vulnerable depends on it.

Terms to Avoid

Why

Preferred Terminology

Addict, Abuser, Junkie, User These terms are demeaning because they label a person soley by his/her illness or behavior and imply a permanency to the condition Person with a substance use disorder

Clean or Dirty These words associate symptoms (i.e. positive drug tests) with judgement statements about cleanliness.

Negative, positive, abstinent, substance-free, actively using

Habit or Drug Habit These terms deny the medical nature of the condition and imply that resolution of the problem is simply a matter of willpower in being able to stop the habitual behavior

Substance use disorder, regular substance use

Opioid Replacement or Methadone Maintenance These words imply that treatment medications are equal to street drugs and suggests a lateral move from illegal to legal addiction

Medication-assisted reatment, medicationassisted recovery

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Wells Receives Leader of the Year Award

Stephanie Wells, Director of Anderson County Tourism, is the 2019 recipient of the Middle East Tennessee Tourism Chuck Davis Leadership-Tourism Leader of the Year Award. The Tourism Leader of the Year is awarded to an individual who best exemplifies outstanding leadership in the pursuit of excellence and has advanced the tourism industry in the region.

Wells has been the Director of Tourism in Anderson County since August 2001. She has lead the Tourism Council through multiple website development projects, advertising campaigns and niche marketing campaigns including the Ultimate Waterways, Hit the Trail and Travel 300 years in Three Days.

"When I first became the Director of Tourism, we were using dial-up internet and buying magazine advertisement," said Wells. "The advancement of the internet and the introduction of social media has really changed the industry and I continually challenge myself to keep up with the trends, but also make sure that the right message is getting to the right target audience."

"You can get lost in all the ways to communicate your message today. The most important thing to remember when you have a small budget, is do your homework on the front end, choose wisely and evaluate the results."

During Wells' tenure, the economic impact of tourism in Anderson County has almost doubled from \$66.75 million to \$120.67 million according to Tennessee Department of Tourism Development's 2017 Economic Impact of Travel on Tennessee Counties Study conducted by the Research Department of the U.S. Travel Association in Washington D.C. If you look at the money that Anderson County Government invested in tourism in 2017, you will see that the county receives a 315% return on investment and each household in Anderson County saves \$331.90 in taxes each year because of tourism generated spending.

"I am fortunate that we have tourism partners in Anderson County that work hard and are dedicated to growing the industry in the county," said Wells. "Many of our attractions are either small businesses or non-profits and some are even volunteer ran and they are competing, successfully, I might add, with large corporate attractions in surrounding counties and states and are nationally recognized by travelers."

Wells is also an active board member of the Friends of Norris Dam State Park, Coal Creek Miners Museum, Anderson County Chamber of Commerce, Rocky Top Chamber of Commerce East Tennessee Preservation

Alliance and the Knoxville Regional Transportation Planning Organization Mobility Advisory Committee. Additionally, Wells served two terms as the Chairperson of the Middle East Tennessee Tourism Council.

An independent panel of tourism professionals selected the awardees from a group of nominated tourism leaders. The award was presented at the East Tennessee State Legislators Lunch on Hospitality & Tourism presented by the Greater Knoxville Hospitality Association, Visit Knoxville and the Middle East Tennessee Tourism Council on February 8, 2019. The Middle East Tennessee Tourism Council is an organization made up of Destination Marketing Organization representatives from the 16 counties in the Middle East Tennessee Region.
