Items you need to bring to the VITA Site to have your tax returns prepared

To file taxes electronically on a married filing joint tax return, both spouses must be present to sign the required forms.

It is extremely important that each person use the correct Social Security Number (SSN). The most accurate information is usually located on your original Social Security card.



Next year we change to the east side of the park and may include a walk across the dam! Wonder what kind of attention we can draw with a crowd on the dam at midnight???








Flu Vaccine

Why do I get the flu after I've been vaccinated? Did I catch it from the shot? Flu vaccines take up to two weeks to become effective. Also, every year the CDC attempts to create a vaccination that will cover the scientifically proven strands of the flu that are likely to occur but sometimes you are exposed to strands of the flu that are not covered under one of those that was in your vaccine. So when is flu season? Flu season actually begins in approximately



October and ends closer to March but the highest month with positive flu tests tends to be after the first January. The flu shot vaccinations effectiveness only lasts 3 to 4 months after it becomes effective in the body surprisingly. Symptoms of the flu could include fever, cough, fatigue, as well as body aches; some people complain of having these symptoms after receiving the flu shot but on a much milder level than would be experienced with the actual Flu. Some patients that may be at a higher risk of getting the flu are elderly patients, over the age of 65, and young children. Lastly, there are two vaccine options; a nasal spray and a shot. A nasal spray is a live flu virus used for ages between 2 and 49 years old. Flu shots are given to patients 6 months and older. The nasal spray may not be for everyone however, since it carries many eligibility factors that the shot does not. The flu shot comes in two doses, a standard dose available for any age above 6 months and a high dose for people over the age of 65. The flu shot is administered in the arm with relatively mild discomfort.

Norris Dam State Park News

Hiking Elkins Trail: Norris Dam State Park

Norris Dam State Park has a new hiking and mountain biking trail. Elkins Trail is a scenic trail that meanders through the woods, follows along hilltops offering glimpses of surrounding land, slopes to the water's edge of Norris Lake, and during the wet season crosses a few small creeks. Elkins Trail is part of the Andrews Ridge Trail System.

Elkins Trail is 2.2 miles and all of it, with the exception of a small portion which overlaps Rock Creek Trail, was put in by volunteer Chuck Morris. Chuck enjoys hiking and mountain biking which brought him to Norris Dam State Park. After riding in the park he became very familiar with the existing trails. After exploring all the trails he saw some of the land was not being used in terms of trail availability, so he created a new trail.

To lay out the best route Chuck spoke with Park Manager Mark Morgan. Morgan told Chuck about old roadbeds which were used prior to the designation of the state park. Chuck walked the old roadbeds, consulted with topographic maps and pictured the layout in his head to piece together sections of land that would and would not work.

To hike Elkins Trail, park at the designated pull off area located across the street from the west campground dump station. Do not park in the dump station turnaround; that must be kept open for camper use. The trailhead is next to Andrews Ridge trailhead, which is located at an information kiosk. Please be aware all mileage is approximate.

The first section skirts a hilltop and is relatively level with only a few small inclines. The beginning section of the trail is single track and within a few yards drops to the right. Soon the single track trail meets an old roadbed. At this point there is a sign, go left to access Norris Lake or right to connect with Rock Creek Trail. This portion of the trail is a loop; hiking either way will lead back to this point. I chose to turn left towards Norris Lake. The trail will return to single track; a few yards later the trail makes a hard right and returns once more to the roadbed. At this point the land flattens on the left marking the hilltop while the trail slopes downward on the right side. About a quarter mile in the trail curves, continue to the left. Not far ahead the trees open up exposing a power line offering a view of neighboring hills and valleys. Immediately after is a small stand of white pine trees. It is easy to identify white pine from other pine trees because it has five needles per bundle. If you look closely you will see that the needles are in groups, often two to five. White pine is the only pine with five needles per bundle in the eastern part of the United States.

The second quarter mile is marked by gradually descending off the hilltop. As it does the trail veers to the right and returns to single track. You will soon see two trees which grow over the trail and mark an "x."

WARNING TO MOUNTAIN BIKERS!! Watch your head as you pass underneath them. Immediately after these two trees the trail drops about two feet and makes a hard left. At this point the trail levels and widens again. As you veer to the right there is a series of "trail moguls." I equate these to ski moguls, small bumps along the ski slope, or in this case, the

hillside. Be aware there are washouts, ruts, and roots in this section. The trail begins to gradually descend again. As it does, look to the right to see a draw. Draws are similar to valleys in that both are surrounded by higher ground. However, valleys are level making them easy to maneuver around while draws are not level and can be difficult to maneuver.

The next fourth tenths of a mile parallels a creek bed. The trail flattens out and makes a wide switch back. As you make the bend there is a small pond on the left; a small trickle of water flows under the trail creating a creek. This section of the trail is fairly level. For the next two tenths of a mile there are several spurs on the hillside to the left. A spur is a short, continuous, sloping line of higher ground jutting out from a hillside; these are created by parallel streams. The trail continues to gradually descend with a break where the grade steepens for a few yards. At approximately nine tenths of a mile in, look up and to the right to see the power line which crossed the trail earlier. It is visible during winter months but is obstructed from view by leaves during the rest of the year. While the creek bed is now dry it is evident water once traveled downhill cutting a deep rut

in the already existing draw.

One mile in Elkins Trail reaches Norris Lake. The trail is at the back of a cove. This cove marks the boundary between park and TVA land. You are now at the bottom of the ridgeline. The trail returns to single track is level for a few yards. For the next three tenths of a mile the trail climbs perpendicular to the hill. Be aware, this section of the trail is not level; the footpath has the same slope as the hill. Several tree saplings boarder the trail. Just past the one mile marker is a beautiful spot for photographers. To the right is a small rock outcrop and to the left is Norris Lake. During the winter TVA's boat launch on Oak Grove Road is visible. Several yards later the trail veers away from Norris Lake. When the water level is down a creek, which feeds Norris Lake, is visible. At this point it appears Elkins Trail meets another trail. This is the spur from Rock Creek Trail to the water's edge. Turn to the right to continue on Elkins Trail heading towards Rock Creek.

Look for the tree on the right which is growing out of a rock. This portion of the trail is fairly level before it begins to climb perpendicular to the hill once more. A little past the mile and a half point Elkins Trail meets Rock Creek Trail (blazed orange); the two trails overlap for approximately four tenths of a mile. At this point veer to the right to stay on Elkins Trail/Rock Creek. Rock Creek is single track and begins to climb up the hill, gradually at first and then steepening. At a quarter mile you will cross two bridges. The trail makes a switchback, levels and widens once more. At the bench, Rock Creek and Elkins split. Rock Creek veers to the left while Elkins turns right. The trail ascends the hill once more for a quarter of a mile. At the top the loop ends. Turn left to return to the trailhead. This short section is only a tenth of a mile.

A few general notes about Elkins Trail. The trail is clearly visible with the exception of the first tenth of a mile. This is a new section and the path has not been worn down yet. The rest of the trail follows a clearly defined roadbed and Rock Creek Trail. Elkins Trail is not shown on the park's trail map yet. The trail is currently marked by temporary signs but will be replaced with blazes.

It took Chuck a little over five months to complete the trail, beginning in March and working to early September 2015. However, he is not finished. He is expanding Norris Dam's trail system, and is currently working on a section from Oak Grove Road to Marine Railway. This section primarily parallels U.S. Highway 441.

State parks are public lands and belong to the people; Chuck wants people visit and take advantage of what parks have to offer. On behalf of Chuck and Norris Dam State Park, get out and enjoy Elkins Trail!




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
