

Rocky Top Parade

The parade will be Friday, December 4, 2015 and the theme is 'Twas' The Night Before Christmas". The parade will start at 7 p.m. and registration will be from 5 to 6:30 p.m. Please be aware that everyone participating in the parade must register, sign a release and receive a number regardless if you want to be judged or not. If you do not register and receive a number, you will be asked to leave the parade line

If you are driving a classic or antique car in the parade, you will need to park at Lake City Internal Medicine. You will also Parade register at that location. Please back your car into one of the spaces provided



while you are waiting for the parade to start. Emergency vehicles will line up on Industrial Park Road. Industrial Park Road to Hustler Boat Lane will be closed at 5 p.m. until all parade participants leave the area.

If you plan on participating in the parade with an all terrain vehicle, the driver must be 16 years of age or older and you will register at the Lake City Middle School.

If you are sponsoring a float or a group, you must also register at the Lake City Middle School. Only one person representing the float has to fill out the registration but please be aware that you are releasing liability for everyone participating on your float. All floats and everyone participating with floats must be lined up behind the Middle School. Anyone participating with a horse will also register at the Lake City Middle School. All horses must wear a horse diaper or you will not be eligible to participate in the parade.

Cash prizes will be awarded for first, second and third place in the float category and first and second place in the group category. Trophies will be awarded to the first and second place in the tractor, horse, antique car and hot rod car category.

In 2014, between November 1st and December 31st, there was a total of six (6) motor vehicle accidents that resulted in injury. 2. Buckle up, slow down, don't drink and drive.



Recipe: Slow-Cooker Vegetable Lasagna

A slow cooker can be your new best friend. There are numerous meals that can be prepared in a slow cooker.

Not just soup and roast. Below is one such recipe. **Ingredients:**

🗆 1 Tbsp. oil

- \Box ½ lb. sliced fresh mushrooms
- \Box 2 red peppers, coarsely chopped

1 pkg. (6 oz.) baby spinach leaves

- □ 1 jar (24 oz.) spaghetti sauce
- □ 1 container (15 oz.) POLLY-O
- Natural Part Skim Ricotta Cheese
- □ 1 pkg. (8 oz.) Shredded Italian
- Cheese
- □ ¼ cup Grated Parmesan Cheese
- 🗆 1 egg
- $\hfill\square$ 6 whole wheat lasagna noodles, uncooked

Instructions:

Heat oil in large skillet on medium heat. Add mushrooms and peppers; cook and stir 3 min. Remove from heat. Add spinach; stir until wilted. Stir in spaghetti sauce.

Mix ricotta, 1-1/2 cups shredded cheese, 2 Tbsp. Parmesan and egg until blended.

Spoon 1-1/2 cups sauce into slow cooker; top with layers of half each of the noodles (broken to fit) and ricotta mixture. Cover with 2 cups sauce. Top with remaining noodles (broken to fit), ricotta mixture and sauce. Cover with lid. Cook on low for 4 to 5 hours (or on HIGH 2 to 3 hours) or until liquid is absorbed. Sprinkle with remaining cheeses; let stand, covered, 10 min. or until shredded cheese is melted.

Norris Dam State Park News

Wild Turkey By Ranger Lauren Baghetti, Ranger at Norris Dam State Park

Over the last several months park staff have enjoyed watching a flock of wild turkeys in the park. We have watched them grow from small turkeys with down fuzzy feathers to adults with flight feathers. As the maintenance crew and I watched them cross the road the other day an idea came to one of them: my next article should be on turkeys as Thanksgiving is this month.

Wild turkeys are different from domesticated turkeys, like the ones we often eat for Thanksgiving dinner. Wild turkeys belong to the

Phasianidae, pheasant, family. They are large, plump birds with long legs, a long neck, and a bald head. Their feathers are bronze and iridescent. The wing feathers are barred with white. Turkeys range in length from 36 to 48 inches and their wingspan is 49 to 64 inches. They can be heavy birds weighing anywhere from 5 to 23 pounds. While turkeys are easily identifiable by their size, males have physical characteristics which make them stand out from the females. Adult males have a red and blue head with red wattles on their neck and throat. A wattle is a flesh lobe which hangs down from the neck. They are also distinguishable by their beards on the chest.

Turkeys are found in and around forested areas and scattered openings and fields, but they are also found in grasslands and swamps. They are ground dwelling animals, but during the night they roost in trees. Turkeys forage for food on the forest floor. They will scratch in leaf litter exposing food. They are omnivores eating nuts, seeds, fruit, roots and bulbs, plant material, insects, spiders, frogs, lizards, and salamanders. Like many other animals, turkeys are most active in the morning and evening. Walking and running are their primary modes of movement, but they can fly short distances.

During the spring male turkeys will attract a female mate. They will strut around with their feathers puffed out, tails raised and spread, and gobble. After mating, females will build a shallow nest on the ground. A clutch is usually 4 to 17 eggs which



incubate for approximately one month. Eggs are white to pale buff and are dotted with reddish brown specks. Once the eggs hatch the mother will feed the young for only a few days and then the young turkeys fend for their own food. Although they forage for their own food they remain in the flock. Wild turkeys have an average life span of three to four years in the wild.


Wild turkeys were an important food for Native Americans and early settlers. However, by the early 20th century, most of the population had dramatically decreased due to overhunting and land clearing. In the 1940's reintroduction programs were established. With modern wildlife management practices turkeys were reintroduced and made a successful recovery; so much so that there is a turkey season now. Wild turkeys are found in every county in Tennessee.

As many families sit down on Thursday, November 26th, think about this: it is said that founding father Benjamin Franklin proposed the wild turkey be the national bird instead of the bald eagle. Norris Dam State Park wishes everyone a safe and enjoyable Thanksgiving. **Gobble Gobble**


