ROCKY TOP GIVES DONATION TO SUPPORT FAMILY DRUG TREATMENT COURT

ROCKY TOP, TN – At City Council last week, Thursday, October 20th, Mayor Michael Lovely, Police Chief Jim Shetterly and City Manager Michael Foster presented a check for \$500 to Stephanie Strutner, Executive Director of Allies for Substance Abuse Prevention of Anderson County, Inc. to support the Family Drug Treatment Court of Anderson County.

"The Family Drug Treatment Court has been under development for a number of years," said Strutner, "based on best practices from effective programs from across the country." The program is geared toward rehabilitating not only adolescents through the Juvenile Court system, but their family unit.

Juvenile Court Judge Brian Hunt said "this program offers the possibility to break the generational cycle of substance abuse many of our juvenile offenders' experience. It also offers hope; hope that these adolescents can stay out of jail as adults and become contributing members of their community."

The Family Drug Treatment Court was first funded in part by the United Way of Anderson County. The recent gift from the City of Rocky Top brings the needed funding to 50 percent. ASAP is committed to finding a way to bridge the funding gap to make this essential program happen," according to Strutner.

Police Chief Jim Shetterly said "this gift is a great opportunity for our city to show support for our children. We believe it will help provide them a new path."

WILSON CEMETERY CLEAN-UP



ROCKY TOP CHRISTMAS PARADE - FRIDAY, DECEMBER 2ND AT 7:00 P.M.

The City of Rocky Top and the Rocky Top Chamber of Commerce would like to invite you to participate in the upcoming Christmas Parade. The parade will be on Friday, December 2, 2016 at 7 p.m. The theme for this year's parade is "Once Upon A Christmas". Participants are encouraged to decorate their floats in accordance with the theme.

Registration will start at 5:00 p.m. and everyone must be registered by 6:45 p.m. so that all participants can get in line for the parade. Everyone that participates in the parade must register and sign a release form. In order to expedite this process, you can find a Registration / Waiver Form at www.rockytoptnchamber.com that you can bring completed to the registration table.

If you are driving a classic or antique car in the parade, you will need to park and register at Lake City Internal Medicine, on Industrial Park Road. Please back your car into one of the spaces provided while you are waiting for the parade to start.

Emergency vehicles will line up on Industrial Park Road. Industrial Park Road to Hustler Boat Lane will be closed at 5 p.m. until all parade participants leave the area.

If you plan on participating in the parade with an all-terrain vehicle, you must have a permit to drive on the street with the City of Rocky Top and be prepared to follow all requirements of the city ordinance. You can obtain a permit at City Hall or the Police Department. For more information, visit www.rockytoptnchamber.com/atvsonroad or call the City of Rocky Top at 865-426-2838. Please note that you will still need to complete and submit a parade registration and release at Lake City Middle School to participate in the parade. Please be prepared to show your permit to ride on the roads from the City of Rocky Top.

Anyone participating with a horse will also register at the Lake City Middle School. All horses must wear a horse diaper or you will not be eligible to participate in the parade.

If you are sponsoring a float or a group, you must also register at the Lake City Middle School. All floats and everyone participating with floats must be lined up behind the Middle School. Please DO NOT LEAVE YOUR VEHICLE PARKED BEHIND THE SCHOOL while you participate in the parade. The gates will be locked when the last float leaves and you will not be able to pick up your car until Monday morning when school resumes.


If you are sponsoring a group or float, please designate a place and time for your group to meet at Lake City Middle School. The volunteers assisting with registration will not be responsible for watching children dropped off by their parents. The group sponsor is responsible for submitting all completed registration / release forms and ensuring that participants under 18 years old, have a completed form signed by the child's guardian and ensuring that all participants are aware of the rules regarding the parade.

PLEASE BE AWARE THAT YOU WILL NOT BE ABLE TO PARTICIPATE IN THE PARADE IF YOU ARE NOT REGISTERED AND HAVE SIGNED THE RELEASE FORM.

Cash prizes will be given out at the City Council Meeting on Dec. 15th for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place floats and 1st and 2nd place groups and there will be trophies for 1st and 2nd place in the tractor, antique car, hot rod and horse categories.

NORRIS DAM STATE PARK RECEIVES \$84,000 FROM STATE

The machine will also be used in the Norris Watershed.

Julie Graham, former Director of East Tennessee Quality Growth and Chuck Morris, a volunteer, assisted the park with the application and the paperwork to secure the grant.

"Julie and Chuck's efforts are greatly appreciated by the park staff," said Mark Morgan, Norris Dam State Park Manager. "The park will not only reap the reward of their hard work but so will the adjacent Norris Watershed and ultimately the visitors using these trails."

The Recreation Educational Trail Program (RTP) is a federal funded, state administered grant program. RTP provides grant funding for land acquisition for trails, trails maintenance and restoration / rehabilitation, trail construction, and trail head support facilities. All grant projects must be on publicly owned land.



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
