HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS

CHILDREN

- Carry a flashlight.
- Walk, don't run.
- Stay on sidewalks.
- Stay in a group, walk slowly, and communicate where you are going.
- Only trick-or-treat in well-known neighborhoods at homes that have a porch light on.
- Never enter a stranger's home or car for a treat.
- Make sure costumes don't drag the ground.
- Avoid wearing masks that make it difficult for you to see. If possible, take off masks when you move from one house to another.
- Carry only flexible knives, swords, or other props.
- If there is no sidewalk, walk on the left side of the road facing traffic.
- Wear clothing with reflective markings or tape.
- Do not approach houses that are not lit.
- Stay away from and don't pet animals you don't know.
- Never consume unwrapped food items or open beverages that may be
- No treats are to be eaten until they are thoroughly checked by an adult at home.

PARENTS

- Do not permit children to bicycle, rollerblade, or skateboard.
- Ensure that your children's costumes are fire retardant.
- Young children at any age should be accompanied by an adult.
- Older children should know where to reach you and when to be home.
- You should know where they're going. Plan and review with your children the route and behavior which is acceptable to you.
- Although tampering is rare, tell children to bring the candy home to be inspected before consuming anything.
- Look at the wrapping carefully and toss out anything that looks suspect

HOMEOWNERS

- Make sure your yard is clear of such things as ladders, hoses, dog leashes and flower pots that can trip young ones.
- Pets get frightened on Halloween. Put them up to protect them from cars or inadvertently biting a trick or treater.
- Battery powered jack o' lantern candles and optional lighting in pumpkins or decorations are preferable to a real flame.
- If you do use candles, place to pumpkin well away from where the trick or treaters will be walking or standing.
- Make sure paper cloth yard decorations won't be blown into a flaming candle.
- Think about healthy food alternatives for trick or treaters.
- Adult party goers should establish and reward a designated driver.



Norris Dam State Park News

28 Campers Graduate from Jr. Ranger Camp

July was a busy and important time at Norris Dam State Park. On Thursday, July 16, 2015, 28 campers completed Jr. Ranger Camp becoming Jr. Rangers. In order to graduate each camper was required to attend all four days, participate in each program and activity, and finally, pass the obstacle course on Thursday.

The week's theme was jobs that park rangers and junior rangers are asked to do. Each day focused on one aspect of a ranger's job and programs were centered on that theme. Monday was safety day. We started with search and rescue. Rangers are often asked to find lost hikers in this park, as well as in other parks. We talked about how to prevent becoming lost in the park, and what they should do if they are lost. Anderson County Deputy Kim Lay and canine officer Al talked about how they work with park rangers to find lost hikers. To demonstrate, we "lost" Ranger Jazmine and Deputy Lay and Al helped find her utilizing tracking techniques that we learned. In the afternoon campers learned a few basic first aid skills and built their own first aid kit. Being so close to Norris Lake water safety was important to discuss. In addition to learning how to properly wear a life jacket, campers also learned how cold water can lead to hypothermia which, in turn, affects movement in water. The day was wrapped up with fire safety. Campers built an edible fire while learning the proper and safest way to build a campfire.



Tuesday was natural resources day. Rangers are responsible for the forest and all that is within it. Vicki from TVA started off the rainy day talking about water quality and why it is important to maintain a clean water supply. Campers performed several tests on water samples taken from Norris Lake and Clinch River. The lesson then transitioned to nonnative invasive species and how they affect native flora and fauna. We took a short hike and discovered Norris Dam State Park has a few of its own invasive species like autumn olive and tree of heaven. After lunch campers learned about reduce, reuse, and recycle practices by making birdfeeders from used plastic bottles and homemade birdseed. Junior Rangers also learned about animal populations and what influences their growth and decline, the availability of food, water, and shelter, and the presence of predators, disease, and occurrence of natural disasters. There was just enough time to plant a tulip poplar tree, Tennessee's state tree, in the rustic cabin area before the second rain storm started. Just as the CCC or Roosevelt's tree army planted trees in and around the park, so did the campers.

Wednesday was interpretation day. Campers learned that interpretation is teaching others about wildlife, history, and culture. When they have an interest in an object or topic they should share their knowledge and enthusiasm about it so others may grow an appreciation for it and a desire to keep and maintain its presence. The morning was spent learning about history and culture. For example, as campers walked across the dam they learned about TVA and the history of Norris Dam. Cherokee culture was taught through the making of corn husk dolls. After lunch Ranger Michael Hodge from Frozen Head State Park came and shared his passion and expertise regarding insects and spiders. After an exciting hunt to collect their own bugs, campers learned about the insects they caught. They wrapped up the day by creating nature journals. Entries included information and drawings of trees, insects, animals, history, and other memories of camp.



Thursday was "first day on the job." We split into three groups and tackled a diverse field of projects-each mimicking a responsibility a ranger would assume on his or her first day on the job. Each camper packed a ranger backpack with items they would need to survive in the park: a park map and whistle for search and rescue operations, a trash bag for litter pick-up or a makeshift rain jacket, and of course, their first aid kits just to name a few items. They also helped with the rustic cabin renovation project. Each camper painted a picture that was framed and hung in the cabins for guests to enjoy as they stay at the park. Additionally, just as each ranger is required to pass a

physical obstacle course for our training, the campers were held to the same standard. The obstacle course was tough, but each camper successfully completed it. They began with jumping jacks and then had to run to the marina and properly put on a life jacket and then run to Norris Lake. After taking the life jacket off they were to run to the park office to complete paperwork, but along the way they discovered a raccoon had scattered trash in the picnic area. Campers had to place each item in the trash or recycle. When they made it to the office a park visitor asked them a question about the park, lake, or general information. When they left the office they ran to the campground and gave an interpretive program to fellow campers about an invasive species, bugs, or TVA. They then went to the playground and performed first aid on a scraped knee. Just when they thought the morning was over they received a call saying a hiker was lost! However, upon successfully completing the obstacle course they were informed the hiker had been found.

Whew! What a first day on the job and all before lunch. After a grilled lunch campers finished their nature journals and wrote letters to family and friends explaining why they should go to camp next year. Campers even found time to give back to the park by building a new carrying box for the park's programming owls. Rangers often go to schools, churches, and community groups talking about owls and snakes. The boxes we use to transport the

owls were falling apart, but thanks to the help of our campers, rangers can now safely transport owls to programs. The week came to a close at the graduation ceremony. Campers were issued a camp t-shirt, badge, and certificate. They took the Jr. Ranger oath and were sworn in as Jr. Rangers for Tennessee State Parks.

All in all, it was a successful week-no campers were lost on the hikes, we weren't chased by yellow jackets, and only had one rainy day, but most importantly, campers and rangers had a good time. Junior Ranger camp could not have happened without the help of many. Seasonal interpretive rangers Jazmine Kennedy and Brittany Perryman created the schedule, pulled together many ties behind the scenes, and carried out the camp. A Big Thank You goes to them. Park staff helped with camp from day one. Office staff answered questions, promoted it, collected registration, and made Thursday's activities go off without a hitch. Our maintenance staff helped campers put together a new owl cage and grilled hotdogs for lunch on Thursday. Housekeeping staff also helped with Thursday's activities and after camp was done and cleaned up, they hung the artwork in the rustic cabins. We had several guest speakers throughout the week and businesses that made donations, thank you to all. Last but most certainly not the least, thank you Jr. Rangers and parents and grandparents! Without campers attending and parents dropping off and picking up, Jr. Ranger camp would never have happened. Thank you and we will see you around the park.



Planning ahead for Medicare!

Medicare season is quickly approaching. That can mean relief, confusion or just more commercials and mail! Many people may not know where to get help selecting the plan that fits their needs.

This time of year is also known as the Annual Enrollment Period (AEP), which starts on October 1st, 2015 (when you can see what next year plans look like) October 15th, 2015 (when you can start enrolling in plans for next year) and the last day to enroll is December 7th, 2015 (for your plan to begin on January 1st, 2016).

This is when beneficiaries who have Original Medicare (also known as the Red, White and Blue card) can keep, choose a new or disenroll from their current plan for next year.

Reasons to be aware of the AEP can include

- Changing plans based on new or different medications (not all plans cover the same medications the same way),
- Your doctor quit accepting your previous plan at some point during this
 past year and you want to continue going to that doctor,
- You have a procedure planned for next year and want a plan more suited to your needs.

This is also the time of year where you may receive numerous marketing materials in the mail and TV commercials will be rampant promoting different Medicare plans.

Your options to review your current coverage and enroll in your new coverage could include

- Going it alone (using www.Medicare.gov), , calling Medicare's 800 number
