Top Tips for Car Seats

Only buy a used car seat if you know its full crash history. That means you must buy it from someone you know, not from a thrift store or over the internet. Once the car seat has been in a crash, it needs to be replaced.

We know that when adults wear seatbelts, kids wear seat belts. So be a good example and buckle up for every ride. Be sure everyone in the vehicle buckles up, too. NEVER leave your child alone in a car, not even for a minute. While it may be tempting to dash out for a quick errand, the temperature inside your car can rise 20 degrees and cause heatstroke in the time it takes for you to run in and out of the store.

Top Tips for Booster Seats

When your child is seated in the booster seat, make sure the lap and shoulder belts fit. The lap belt should fit low across the hips and the shoulder belt across the shoulder.

Do not place the shoulder belt under the child's arm or behind the child's back.

Use a booster seat with the vehicle lap AND shoulder safety belts until your child passes the following Safety Belt Fit Test:

The child's knees should bend at the edge of the seat when his or her back and bottom are against the vehicle seat back; and the vehicle lap belt should fit across the upper thighs; and the shoulder belt should fit across the shoulder and chest.

Children are usually between 8 and 12 years old when the seat belt fits them properly.

Top Tips for Children and Seat Belts

Once your children pass the Safety Belt Fit Test, teach them the importance of using seat belts on every ride, whether they're with you or not. This is a habit you can instill in an early age. If they learn this lesson early, they'll be more likely to buckle up when they're older or when you're not around.

Kids are VIPs – just ask them. VIPs ride in the back seat, so keep all kids in the back seat until they are 13.

A lap or shoulder belt provides the best protection for your children and should be used on every ride.

We know kids like to slouch or lean against the windows during the drive, but it makes a difference in terms of safety. Have your children upright when using seat belts.

Closing - The Rocky Top Public Library will be closed Saturday September 5th and Monday September 7th in observance of Labor Day.

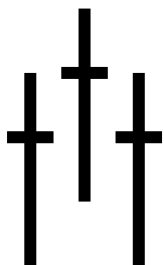

Fly Fishing Retreat for Women Surviving Breast Cancer

NORRIS—Women who have or have had breast cancer, and anyone who’d like to help them, will be interested in a presentation Thursday evening, Sept. 10, about Casting for Recovery, an annual fly fishing retreat for women surviving breast cancer.

Lindsay Long, program coordinator for the East Tennessee Breast Cancer Retreat, along with women who’ve experienced the free retreat, will speak at a free, public meeting of the Clinch River Chapter, Trout Unlimited. The program starts at 7 p.m. in the parish hall at St. Francis Episcopal Church, 158 W. Norris Road, Norris.

The Clinch River Chapter has supported the East Tennessee retreat with volunteers and funding since 2006, the year before the first East Tennessee retreat was held. Anglers and fly tyers interested helping with the retreat are encouraged to attend the Sept. 10 program.

Casting for Recovery is a national nonprofit organization that operates 42 free fly fishing retreats nationwide, providing appropriate gentle exercise through fly casting and the emotional support of peers as women experience a new activity in a safe environment. The retreats help address quality of life issues that women face after a cancer diagnosis.

“Days of the Pioneer”

The fourth annual “Days of the Pioneer” Antique Show will feature the finest selection of 18th and 19th century American antiques. An extensive collection of some of the finest dealers hail from across the United States, waiting a year to participate in this first class event. This year’s affair is set for Friday and Saturday, September 11-12, 2015, and will be held on the picturesque grounds of the Museum of Appalachia.

“Days of the Pioneer,” a premier antique show, continues to be overwhelming success for antique enthusiasts from all over the country. During the show, historic demonstrations take place in select locations throughout the village, where tradesman operate some of the Museum’s antique facilities; pounding away on the iron forge in the blacksmith shop, slicing logs on the tractor-driven sawmill, and grinding cane with a mule-driven mill, for guests to experience up close.

Settle in and listen to old-time, mountain musicians as they pick away on some of the historic cabin porches, playing traditional Appalachian music; or stop and visit with either Civil or Revolutionary War re-enactors, dressed in full garb and regalia, as they stroll the grounds.





The Norris Lake Project Team will be hosting an "Island Invasion" on this year's National Public Lands Day, September 26, 2015 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. The Team has conducted a biannual Five County Norris Lake Cleanup in September since 2011 but this year there will be a concentrated focus on the islands in the Loyston Sea area in Anderson and Union Counties and the islands near Lonas Young Park in Campbell County, hence the name

"Island Invasion."

"Since 2011, volunteers from the counties surrounding Norris Lake have picked up over 15 tons of trash," said Stephanie Wells, Director of the Anderson County Tourism Council. "We have typically focused on the public launches and State Parks throughout the five counties but this year we want to focus on the islands which are popular camping spots and common places that debris washes up."

The islands in the Loyston Sea area that the group will invade are Pilot Island, Wood Duck Island, Bear Hole Island and Baker Island. The launch point for the Loyston Sea side of the lake will be at Big Ridge State Park and the launch point for the Campbell County side is at Lonas Road Park. Volunteers can register and get assigned a location at these launch points.

There will be boats available to shuttle volunteers to and from the islands and barges will be used to transfer the trash back to the shore. However, volunteers are welcome to bring their own boats. All volunteers are encouraged to wear appropriate shoes, preferably boots, bring gloves and bring a life jacket.

Volunteers will be able to trade their trash bags for a free "Island Invader" t-shirt and a free lunch.

The Norris Lake Project Team is a grassroots effort of individuals, organizations, businesses and agencies to preserve the water quality of Norris Lake, conserve the land surrounding the lake and encourage the stakeholders of the lake to do their part in keeping Norris Lake the cleanest and safest recreational asset in Anderson, Campbell, Claiborne, Grainger and Union Counties.

Norris Dam State Park News



New trail is open with some signage !!! Starting at the Andrews Ridge Trailhead just below the West campground, the start of the trail takes you through the woods to a loop junction. Turn right and the trail descends and intersects Rock Creek trail. You share that trail to Norris Lake at which time our new yet un-named trail continues around the point back into the next cove. From there, its a steady climb back up and and



around and up some more coming out behind the Regional Warehouse. Cross the power line and its level back to the rear of Ranger Baghetti's house. There is a short cut off to the left to prevent using her yard and your back to the junction starting point, parking area to the right, 2.2miles. This trail is open to bikes / hikers. We will blaze it red in the near future. Go check it out and let us know what you think. Volunteer

Chuck Morris worked many hours on this trail and is already working on the next trail to run along Hwy 441.



In 2008, the Knoxville Track Club formed a Trails Committee to develop a comprehensive schedule of off-road events that raise the awareness of trail running and attract more trail running participants. Since then, the KTC trail series has expanded to more than a dozen races annually at city, county and state parks throughout East Tennessee. Norris Dam State Park and Norris Municipal Watershed is one site in this series that provides miles of scenic and challenging single track trails to the delight of recreational and competitive trail runners. Norris Dam State Park will once again host the Norris Dam Hard Trail Race on November 14, 2015. The 2015 race will include the traditional 25k and 50k races and this year will add a 50 mile race. All three race options will take place on single track trails and jeep roads spanning across both Norris Dam State Park and Norris Municipal Watershed areas. Each year, the Knoxville Track Club Trails Committee gives back to the parks that provide the beautiful venues for its trail races – places like Norris Dam State Park. KTC Trails Committee Chair Michael deLisle said, “last year was a successful year for the series and our committee. Proceeds from the races support our KTC Youth Athletics program, and we also give back to the parks that support us. It’s a win- win partnership.” Norris Dam State Park Manager Mark Morgan said, “The funds received by the Friends group will be used to purchase back country gear and supplies to support the park rangers and staff while working future events.” Public-private partnerships like this help increase the programming capacity and quality of Tennessee State Parks. INSURANCE AGENT CORNER

Insurance Corner, Understanding who gets paid (or doesn't get paid)

There are many types of insurance.

Some you get to choose if you want (Life insurance, Renter's, Cancer, Heart Attack, Stroke or Accident policies to name a few and sometimes called Indemnity policies)

Some you are required to own (Auto, if you own a car, Home Owner's, if you have a mortgage, Health Insurance)

But the thing many people do not understand is who does the insurance pay?

If you have life insurance, it pays your named Beneficiary, often a family member or someone taking care of your final arrangements.

Health Insurance pays the Doctor and the ER and the Hospital. BUT it rarely pays everything. Health Insurance has Co-Pays and Co-Insurance which can leave you having to pay up to \$6600 annually depending on the coverage you have!

The person handling your final affairs may have to use some of that Life Insurance to pay those medical bills!

Or if you use your Health Insurance and survive, you may have additional financial issues...being unable to work. Then how do you pay the hospital and more importantly how do you afford to put food on the table and keep the roof overhead?

That is where having some of the above mentioned Indemnity policies is helpful! If you have Cancer or a Heart Attack or Stroke even an Accident (and meet certain requirements) those policies can provide you cash (not the doctor or ER or hospital) and you can use that to replace your income.
