

Medicine Disposal Sites

ASAP (Allies for Substance Abuse Prevention) has partnered with the Rocky Top Police Department, Clinton Police Department, Norris Police Department, and Oliver Springs Police Department to install four permanent medicine disposal bin sites at each of those stations.

Drop off your unused, expired or unneeded medications in the bins, which are located in the public areas of each department.

Medicine collected is incinerated to comply with federal guidelines. All paper and plastic containers are recycled. In addition to preventing abuse, disposing of your medications this way also keeps them out of the water supply.

Don't forget to clean out your medicine cabinets and dispose of unused, unwanted or expired medications at the permanent bins located at:

As we reflect back upon this area and our heritage we are blessed to have people still living today that remember our strong coal mining past. The history this area has given us is one to never be forgotten; the Briceville Opera House, the deadly coal mining explosions, Norris Dam, the Lake City Movie Theater, Luallen's Hardware, Duncan's Cash Dry Goods, Chapman's Restaurant, The Dipsy Doodle Drive-In, construction of Interstate 75, new schools and new businesses.



While doing a history search on the name change from Coal Creek to Lake City and Norris Dam, I found similarities from the past to our current opportunity. I would like to reflect on a few I found on the internet. The information listed in bold is from the search.

This area is one of the most desirable vacation destinations in the southeast; Norris Lake has a long history beginning as early as 1911. During this year, the location for a future dam development in the upper Tennessee Valley had been discovered. The future development site named "Cove Creek Site" at the time was chosen due to its natural landscape and ability to host a large dam. On October 1, 1933, the relatively new Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) took on their largest project and first Dam, the construction of Norris Dam.

Just as this area was chosen due to its natural landscape and ability to host a large dam, Lake City was chosen because of its natural landscape and ability to host a Water Park, Theme Park, 3-D Interactive Movie Theater, Bear Lodge, Coal Miners Museum, and much more. Just as TVA took on their largest project and first dam in 1933, Lake City accepted the opportunity to take on the largest project the city has ever seen on June 26, 2014 by changing the name to Rocky Top and moving forward with plans that will allow growth for generations to come.

The initial budget for the project was over \$32 million dollars. Flooding had been a problem for the Tennessee valley for some time, and it was the goal for Norris Dam to bring some stability to the uncontrollable and unpredictable flooding as well as provide a substantial power source to the area. The name for the dam was an honor given to a long time supporter of TVA and Nebraska Senator, George Norris (1861-1944).

The initial goal for building Norris Dam was to bring some stability to the uncontrollable and unpredictable flooding and provide a substantial power source to this area. The growth and improvements that will come forth by changing the name to Rocky Top will bring some stability to the current uncontrollable and unpredictable financial and tourism business situations as well as provide substantial commercial, industrial and economic growth to the area.

On March 4, 1936, Norris Dam was completed with the gates closed. The finished dam itself is 1,860 feet long and 265 feet high. By January of 1937, the Norris Reservoir was filled completely creating the largest reservoir on a tributary of the Tennessee River. Norris Lake hosts 33,840 acres of water surface and approximately 809 miles of shoreline. TVA's finished project, the Norris Dam, also proudly delivers a maximum energy delivery of 131,400 kilowatts.

The building of Norris Dam and the changes it brought to the region inspired films, books, stage plays, and songs. Folk songs from the construction period express enthusiasm for the benefits that the dam project brought to the region

Just as President Franklin D. Roosevelt came to this area and the name was changed from Coal Creek to Lake City, with that change came new growth and opportunities for people, churches and businesses. Improvements were made to the streets, school systems, city and county government, etc.

Now that we are officially 'Rocky Top", all of us at Mark's Pharmacy and Express Clinic look forward to the changes and opportunities that this will bring to the region once again. Who knows what the future will hold. Maybe one day there will be a new film, book, stage play or song about our past from Coal Mining days to all of the changes Rocky Top will bring to this region. We hope you will continue to let us have the privilege of serving you and your family.

Smoky Grilled Pork Chops

Ingredients

- 1 tablespoon seasoned salt
- 1 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1 tablespoon garlic powder
- 1 tablespoon onion powder
- 1 tablespoon ground paprika
- 2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1 teaspoon liquid smoke flavoring
- 4 bone-in pork chops (1/2 to 3/4 inch thick)

Directions

Preheat an outdoor grill for medium heat, and lightly oil the grate.

In a bowl, mix together the seasoned salt, black pepper, garlic powder, onion powder, paprika, Worcestershire sauce, and smoke flavoring until thoroughly combined. Rinse pork chops, and sprinkle the wet chops on both sides with the spice mixture. With your hands, massage the spice rub into the meat; allow to stand for 10 minutes.

Grill the chops over indirect heat until no longer pink inside, about 12 minutes per side. An instant-read thermometer should read at least 145 degrees F (63 degrees C). Allow chops to stand for 10 more minutes before serving.

Skyward On-Line Registration

Parents of students who are currently enrolled in the Anderson County school system may register on-line using their Skyward Family Access account. Again, the on-line registration process is only available for our returning students.

The on-line registration period is July 1st - July 28, 2014.

Go to the Main ACS Website at www.acs.ac

- 1. Click on Skyward, Top Center of the page.
- 2. Click on the FAMILY ACCESS link and log-in to your parent account. **Only Parents** can log-on and register their child online.Student Access will not be turned-on until Aug. 4th.
- 3. Once you enter your parent account, click on On-Line Registration, located in the center of the page, and follow the easy steps.
- 4. If you have forgotten your parent password, click the "Forgot Password Link" located on the bottom of the log-in page. Skyward will e -mail you a copy of password.
- 5. If you have forgotten your username, you will need to call the school office and ask for help with your account. Keep in mind, school offices officially open on July 24th.
- 6. If you miss the on-line registration period, you will be able to register on Aug. 4th, using our paper form.

All NEW students to ACS will need to register in the school office (on paper) registration day, which is Aug. 4th.

Summer Fun at Norris Dam State Park


Once the sun sets people often go indoors missing out on the night side of nature, which is quite active. As the sun sets fireflies light up the dark night, frogs fill the air with their loud calls, and bats fly from their roosts to scour for food. Nocturnal animals such as raccoons, opossums, and bobcats begin roaming. Another aspect of the night side is the sky. Stars, planets, comets, the Milky Way, and some galaxies are visible with the naked eye or with the aid of a telescope.

As the sun sets, which is a star, other stars and planets "come out." Days and nights are created as Earth spins around its axis. Think of an imaginary line running from the North to the South Pole. Earth rotates around this line. When North America is facing the sun it is day, as it turns away from the sun the sky becomes dark. At this point other stars and planets become visible; their light is no longer shadowed by the sun's light. Stars are connected by imaginary lines to form constellations. Constellations can guide viewers to other constellations, give directions, and are often associated with stories

The Big Dipper can be used to find the North Star, known as Polaris, which is located in the Little Dipper. The North Star is visible throughout most of the year. Many slaves escaped to northern states on the Underground Railroad. As they were not able to travel by day and without a map and compass, slaves relied on the sky, especially the North Star as guidance. Often singing the lyrics "follow the drinking gourd," known as the Big Dipper, they located the North Star. With it in sight, they knew they were traveling in the right direction to freedom. Another constellation is Scorpius, the scorpion.

Scorpius can be clearly seen in the evenings of July and August. It is seen in the southern sky right above the horizon. This means southern states have the best view. It is more difficult to see Scorpius in the northern sky due to summer haze and particles in the atmosphere. Scorpius is comprised of 15 stars with Antares being the brightest. Antares, pronounced Ann-tair-ees, means "rival of Mars" and is rightfully named. Antares is a bright red star and the color of it is similar to that of Mars. It is half the average temperature of the sun and the diameter is 500 times the size of the sun. It is so large that if Antares was the solar system's sun, Earth would be engulfed by it.

Antares is the heart of Scorpius. Descending to the left is a string of stars which curl back making the spine and tail. The last two stars in the tail are the stingers. The body continues to the right of Antares ending with three stars which run in a north-south row making



these the claws.

The story associated with Scorpius involves another constellation, Orion. Orion was the son of a poor farmer and the gods blessed him with excellent hunting skills. He enjoyed killing animals rather than for necessity. This upset the gods and goddesses. Artemis, the goddess of hunting, sent Scorpius to sting and kill Orion. At the last moment before dying Ophiunchus the healer saved him. Orion repented and was placed in the sky along with Scorpius. Orion represents light and life as Scorpius represents the opposite, dark and death. Orion is found in the winter months, opposite of Scorpius. Scorpius is always following Orion unable to catch him. As one sets the other rises.

If you are having trouble locating Scorpius or want a closer view of Antares and other stars stop by the park on a Saturday night. The Knoxville Observers bring telescopes to get a closer look. They set up in the pool parking lot around dusk. For dates when they come check out their website, http://www.knoxobservers.org or call the park office at (865) 426-7461.
