The parade will start at 7 p.m. and registration will be from 5 to 6:30 p.m. Please be aware that everyone participating in the parade must register, sign a release and receive a number regardless if you want to be judged or not. If you do not register and receive a number, you will be asked to

leave the parade line. If you are driving a classic or antique car in the parade, you will need to park at Lake City Internal Medicine, adjacent to the Lake City Middle School on Industrial Park Road. You will

at that location. Please back your car into one of the spaces provided while you are waiting for the parade to start.

Emergency vehicles will line up on Industrial Park Road. Industrial Park Road to Hustler Boat Lane will be closed at 5 p.m. until all parade participants leave the area.

If you plan on participating in the parade with an all terrain vehicle, the driver must be 16 years of age or older and you will register at the Lake City Middle School.

If you are sponsoring a float or a group, you must also register at the Lake City Middle School. Only one person representing the float or group has to fill out the registration but please be aware that you are releasing liability for everyone participating in your group or on your float.





She has worked extremely hard with our students in Anderson County. Her commitment and dedication to substance abuse prevention is outstanding and she is always giving of her time. Her work is recognized throughout our system and is very much appreciated."

Founded as Students Against Driving Drunk in 1981, SADD has grown to become the nation's dominant peer-to-peer youth prevention organization with thousands of chapters in middle schools, high schools and colleges. In 1997, in response to requests from SADD students themselves, SADD expanded its mission and name, and now sponsors chapters called Students Against Destructive Decisions. The Clinton High School chapter has partnered with the ASAP Youth Coalition to take positive actions towards preventing and reducing substance abuse in Anderson County. "ASAP is extremely proud of Mary's achievement and thankful to have her as part of the ASAP Community Coalition and a leader for our youth" states ASAP Project Coordinator Stacey Pratt.

Mary has been recognized for this national honor at many events including the ASAP Community Coalition Meeting, Tennessee Teen Institute at Tennessee Tech University, the Anderson County School Board meeting, and the SADD National Conference in Washington, D.C. Mary Tuskan said "it was a huge honor to be awarded the SADD National Advisor of the year. I am truly blessed to work with such good students at Clinton High School and have the support of the school and the ASAP coalition.

(ASAP) Youth Coalition

Students from Anderson County, Tennessee joined over 400 youth leaders from across the state at the Tennessee Teen Institute. The Tennessee Teen Institute is a five-day youth leadership and prevention camp sponsored by the Jackson Area Council on Alcoholism and Drug Dependency (JACOA). The Anderson County Health Department and ASAP sponsored two teams of six youth to participate in TTI, one from Anderson County High School and one from Clinton High School. This is the third year we have been able to sponsor youth to attend the Teen Institute and it has shown an excellent return. Students return energized to serve as peer leaders and make positive changes in their schools," said Stephanie Strutner, Executive Director of ASAP.

This year marked the 27th year of the Teen Institute Program in Tennessee. The program addresses teen issues such as bullying, violence, suicide, teen pregnancy, distracted driving, teen health and substance abuse prevention through a five-day, peer-led prevention camp designed to provide teen participants with the skills and education necessary to develop and implement alcohol and drug abuse prevention programs in their own communities. "Through training we receive at TTI I am better equipped to continue to lead by example and take action to help other students in my community to choose not to use," said Reagan Wolfe, Clinton High School Senior. TTI is a comprehensive program that trains, mobilizes and empowers youth to prevent the illegal use of alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs and selfdestructive behaviors in themselves and their peers. TTI prepares students to not only make positive changes, but to be proud advocates of those changes. Students will have the opportunity to grow and learn as individuals, while enhancing their leadership abilities. Because TTI is peer-led, teens are given a unique opportunity to have a "voice" in addressing issues important to them. Giving youth some ownership in this type of program is one of the key factors in the success of enforcing a substance free lifestyle.



Bobcats

Working at night at the park is peaceful. There is another world to Mother Nature. It is typically cooler, on clear nights the stars are visible, in the summer crickets, cicadas, and frogs and toads can drown out all other noises, I hear barred owls calling, and often see raccoons, skunks, and opossums. On a few rare occasions I have caught a fleeting glimpse of a bobcat as it runs out of my line of sight. The first was on Christmas Eve in 2010 by the deluxe cabin area, the next time was when one darted in front of the vehicle crossing the road by Norris Dam Marina, and the most recent was a few weeks ago on the east side. Next to seeing a bald eagle on the lake and watching it snow in the park, seeing a bobcat has been one of my favorite and memorable scenes. Why in four years of working here have I only seen three bobcats? They are elusive creatures, seeking solitary company.



Bobcats are rarely seen by people, not because they are endangered, in fact there is a healthy population, but rather for a couple of reasons. One, they are nocturnal. Two, they are secretive and solitary creatures. Instead of using the sense of sight to locate them, one might listen for their calls. However, this is also difficult for they are typically quiet. When they do make sounds, they give out a high-pitched scream, hiss, or low growls. Since bobcats are elusive, you can still find signs of their presence. Look for tracks in mud, wet gravel, or snow. Adult tracks are overall round in shape with four toe pads in the front and rear paws. Unlike canines, their claws are retracted when walking so they are not visible in the tracks. They are approximately 1 ¾ inch wide by 2 inches in length. Also look for scat. The scat is segmented cords with hair and bone from the prey consumed.

Bobcats are in the feline family and somewhat resemble a domestic cat. However, they are about two times the size of an average housecat. They range in length, body and head, from 24 to 42 inches and the tail is an additional 4 to 7 inches. They stand at the shoulder 17 to 30 inches. On average they weigh 10 to 30 pounds, with some sources stating as much as 40 and 50 pounds. If one is lucky to get a glimpse, bobcats are yellowish to buff to brown in color, with dark spots and a white underside. Their fur is

short, soft, and thick. It is easy to identify bobcats from a domestic cat by the tail and ears. Bobcats have a bobbed tail with dark bands on top. In fact, it is from their tail which bobcats get their name. The ears are distinctive with tufts of fur at the ends, unlike household cats which do not have tufted ears. Bobcats also have ruffs of fur on the sides of their head which give them the look of having sideburns.

Bobcats are carnivores and fierce hunters. While they can kill prey larger in size than themselves, they typically hunt smaller game such as rabbit, bird, mice, and squirrel. When hunting, bobcats will stalk, pounce, and bite neck vertebrae to kill their prey. Bobcats are close to the top of the food chain; an adult's predator is people. Bobcat kittens are prey to fox, coyote, and large owls.

Bobcats have a large range; they are found in most of North America, from southern Canada to southern Mexico, with the exception of the mid-west. They thrive in various habitats, including woodlands, chaparrals, swamps, mountains, deserts, and even suburban areas. They are not aggressive animals and attacks on humans and domestic animals are extremely rare. Like foxes and some snakes, bobcats sleep in dens. Hollow logs, brush piles, root balls of uprooted trees, rock crevices, and caves are often used as den sites.

Bobcats are excellent runners, climbers, and swimmers. They have a good sense of hearing, vision, and smell, which helps them stalk prey. The average lifespan for a bobcat in the wild is 10 to 12 years. As mentioned, bobcats are not aggressive animals. There is no reason to actively seek to exterminate them for attacks on domestic animals. They play an important role in an ecosystem; they help control and keep rabbit, rodent, and bird populations in check.



Bobcat and lynx are similar in appearance and easily confused. Lynx are found in more northern regions with colder temperatures, like northern United States and Canada. Both have tufts on their ears, but bobcats have shorter tufts. Bobcats are smaller in size than lynx; they have shorter legs and smaller paws. Their trails are also different. A bobcat's tail has dark spots on top

Their trails are also different. A bobcat's tail has dark spots on top while a lynx's tail looks like the end was dipped in a bottle of ink. Bobcat's fur has irregular spots and a lynx has few spots or blotches on them.

I hope at some point you get a good look of a bobcat in the woods. When you do, take a picture and share it with us the park.

All floats and everyone participating with floats must be lined up behind the Middle School. The area can be accessed near the gym. If you arrive before 5 p.m., please do not park your float or trailer in front of the school. Pull it around to the back but be aware that school dismisses at 3:10 p.m. and the road behind the school is the car rider pick up route.

If you are participating in a walking group without a float, please meet and wait at the office entrance with the awning at the middle school. If you are sponsoring a group or float, please designate a time for your group to meet.

The parade organizers and volunteers will not be responsible for supervising children until the sponsors arrive.

If you are dropping a child off to participate with a walking group or float, please wait until the designated time that the sponsors will be present and please remove your vehicle from the middle school area as soon as possible unless you plan on staying until the parade is over.

Anyone participating with a horse will also register at the Lake City Middle School. All horses must wear a horse diaper or you will not be eligible to participate in the parade.

If you are registering at the Lake City Middle School, registration will be set up just inside of the gym entrance. If you would like to preregister, please click on parade at www.rockytoptnchamber.com to find the registration form and instructions.

Cash prizes will be awarded for first (\$200.00), second (\$150.00) and third (\$100.00) place in the float category and first (\$100.00) and second (\$50.00) place in the group category.

Trophies will be awarded to the first and second place in the tractor, horse, antique car and hot rod car category.

If you would like to be judged in one of these categories, please place your number on the left side of your vehicle. If you do not, place it on the right side. Remember, you have to have a number or you will be asked to leave the parade.

Everyone participating in the parade must make safety their top priority. You will be held liable if your actions cause injury to spectators and other parade participants. You will also be cited if you do not operate your vehicle or all terrain vehicles safely.
