

## Museum of Appalachia Tennessee Fall Homecoming

The 35th annual Tennessee Fall Homecoming will be from October 10th through 12th this year at the Museum of Appalachia, featuring more than 400 traditional musicians, singers, cloggers, and buck dancers.

The three-day
Homecoming is one of the
nation's largest, most
authentic music and folk
festivals. Each day, all day,
musicians perform on five
unique stages, filling the air
with traditional mountain,
folk, bluegrass, Gospel, and
old-time country tunes.

Homecoming includes historic demonstrations of pioneer skills, a large craft fair with authentic Appalachian artisans, and traditional Southern foods.

Fall Heritage Day, with special interactive programs for schoolchildren, is Thursday, October 9th. This day of traditional music, historical games, and hands-on pioneer activities is designed for public and private school groups, home-schooled groups, and individual parents and children. Three-day Homecoming tickets include admission to Fall Heritage Day.

The Museum offers a picturesque backdrop for this annual festival, with dozens of historic log buildings, display halls filled with authentic artifacts, and gardens and farm animals, surrounded by

split-rail fences. A self-guided tour of the Museum and parking is included in Homecoming admission.

All Homecoming proceeds further the Museum's mission to preserve Appalachian history and heritage. A non-profit organization since 2003, the Museum is an official affiliate of the Smithsonian Institution.

#### TAX RELIEF PROGRAM

The City of Rocky Top administers a state-funded Property Tax Relief Program to help elderly citizens pay their property taxes. Property owners may be eligible to receive tax relief for the current tax year if they are 65 years old or older, must reside on the property and have a combined annual income of \$28,270 or less for the year 2013.

There are Tax Relief Programs for disabled homeowners and disabled veterans that do not have to meet the age requirements. The deadline for all tax relief applications is April 6, 2015. For additional questions or to discuss eligibility, contact Terry L. Jones at (865) 426-2838.



## **Rocky Top Parade**

The parade will start at 7 p.m. and registration will be from 5 to 6:30 p.m. Please be aware that everyone participating in the parade must register, sign a release and receive a number regardless if you want to be judged or not. If you do not register and receive a number, you will be asked to leave the parade line. If you are driving a classic or antique car in the parade, you will need to park at Lake City Internal Medicine. You will also *Parade* register at that location. Please back your car into one of the spaces provided while you are waiting for the parade to start.

Emergency vehicles will line up on Industrial Park Road. Industrial Park Road to Hustler Boat Lane will be closed at 5 p.m. until all parade participants leave the area.

If you plan on participating in the parade with an all terrain vehicle, the driver must be 16 years of age or older and you will register at the Lake City Middle School.

The Center will also be hosting a Chili Supper with music by the Woodpickers




and a silent auction from 5 to 8 p.m. in Saturday, November 1st, at the Norris Community Building.

#### **Orange Creamsicle Cheesecake**

#### **Graham Cracker Crust**

1/2 cup butter, melted 2 tablespoons granulated sugar 2 cups graham cracker crumbs

#### Cheesecake

- 2 8 oz packages cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 large eggs
- 1/2 cup sour cream

#### **Orange Creamsicle Layer**

- 1 3 oz box orange flavored gelatin
- 1 1/2 cup boiling water
- 1 8 oz container of whipped topping such as Cool Whip

#### Preheat the oven to 325°.

In a mixing bowl combine the butter, sugar, and graham cracker crumbs. Stir until combined. Pat into a 9" springform pan. Set aside. In a medium mixing bowl whip the cream cheese, sugar, and vanilla. Beat in eggs, one at a time then beat in sour cream. Pour the filling into the crust.

Bake for 40 minutes. Turn of the oven and crack the oven door for 30 minutes. Remove from oven and allow to cool completely. Once cooled mix the creamsicle layer by stirring the gelatin with the boiling water until it dissolves. Then gently whisk in the whipped topping until it's completely combined. Pour over the cheesecake. Set on a plate or dish in case of dripping and place in the freezer for an hour. Remove from the freezer and chill in the refrigerator until ready to serve. I suggest chilling it over night.

When ready to serve use a sharp knife and run it around the pan to separate the gelatin layer from the side. Unhinge the pan and gently lift from the cheesecake.

#### **Hiking Hootin' Hollow Trail**

As I reflect on the trails at Norris Dam State Park I have come to the conclusion I do not have a favorite. Each offers something different that no other trail has, here or elsewhere. They seem to be like fingerprints or snowflakes, no two are alike. Certainly I have a preferable time to hike, but here again, I draw the same answer. Each season brings something new to a trail. Summer brings shade and as leaves overlap one another different shades of green; fall brings bright colors and leaves crunching underneath foot; winter brings views which are hidden in the summer; and spring a sense of renewal and a time to get outdoors

after being cooped up during winter.

Today as I
hiked Hootin' Hollow
Trail it was no
different. I find
enjoyment on this trail
no matter the season.
Hootin' Hollow Trail is
a linear trail,
accessible from
Andrews Ridge Trail
or the west
campground. No



matter which trailhead you start at, park at the trail maintenance office located across the road from the dump station, just below the west campground. Hike approximately four tenths (.4) of a mile on Andrews Ridge Trail, blazed blue. This section of the trail is wide and fairly level. Be aware if you hike it in the summer; the edge of the trail is bordered with poison ivy. The trail runs parallel with the campground, turning away from it at the sharp ninety degree bend to the left. At this point be aware of ruts formed by water running down the hill and along the trail.

You will soon reach the point where three different trails split off, Rock Creek on the left and on the right Hootin' Hollow and further up Sink Hole. Turn right onto Hootin' Hollow Trail, blazed yellow. The trail can be split into three sections. The first section is wide and fairly level. Not far from the trailhead there is a tree that has fallen and the root ball was uprooted. Two tulip poplar trees are now growing from the root ball. As you hike look around and you will see several pine trees that have fallen. In the late 1990's to 2000-2001 the pine beetle came through the region killing many of the pine trees. It takes approximately 10 to 15 years for pine trees to decompose which is why after 15 years dead pine trees are still lying on the ground. There is a slight incline for about 10 yards and then flattens out again.

The trail travels downhill for a short while. As you hike down, notice the ridge top on the right. It also falls, eventually becoming the same elevation as the trail. As the trail flattens out it bends to the left. It remains flat for a short bit then goes down a shallow slope for several yards. At this point the forest opens up

and is not as dense. Many species of trees are found can be found, white, chestnut, and red oak, beech, tulip poplar, sugar and red maple, hickory, dogwood, sweetgum, red bud, and sassafras. The trail curves to the left again, steadily going downhill. At the final bend Norris Lake comes into view, at least during fall and winter months. This is the "edge" of the mountain before it travels down a steep hill to the lake. Take advantage of the covered bench to take in the scenery and rest a few minutes.

This begins the second section of the trail. The trail flattens out and curves to the right; now you are on the other side of the ridge top. The next section is a series of hiking up small hills and flat sections. The lake is visible on your left. Half way up the first hill the trail forks, take the right fork and continue up the hill. It flattens out for only a few yards and then climbs again. These inclines are so slight they are hardly noticeable. During the winter when the trees are bare, roofs' of the office, swimming pool hall, and rec hall are visible. You have to look closely or use binoculars to spot these.

At the final of these small hills is a bench. This marks the third section of the trail. The final section consists of hiking a steep hill for several yards. At this point the trail changes from leaf material and dirt to grass and rock. Watch your footing for ruts and loose rocks. Look for the large oak tree on the right; one branch is so large it is as if a tree is growing in mid-air over the trail. If you are out of breath, or even if you are not, stop and take a look at the hill side. The forest opens up giving a clear view of how steep the hill is, if you have not already noticed. Near the top of



the hill a small footpath veers to the right; continue to the left as the trail bends. Don't give up, you are almost to the top! After the bend the trail continues up hill, but not as steep of an incline. At this point the trail narrows slightly. You will begin to see umbrella magnolia trees at the top. There is enough elevation difference between the two ends of Hootin' Hollow Trail that allows magnolia trees to grow at the higher elevation section but not the lower. The trail ends in the west campground at site number 27.

Hootin' Hollow Trail gets its name from owls that perch in the woods and call out. I encourage everyone to get out and hike Hootin' Hollow Trail. With close observation a lot can be seen: several species of trees, spider webs (I counted at least sixty, five that crossed the trail), Norris Lake, roof tops, litter (don't forget to pick up your trash!!), and two uprooted trees with saplings growing out of the root ball. Get out there and enjoy the fall weather!!


IMLS museum grants support a wide variety of projects that create learning experiences, strengthen communities, care for collections and provide broad public access.
