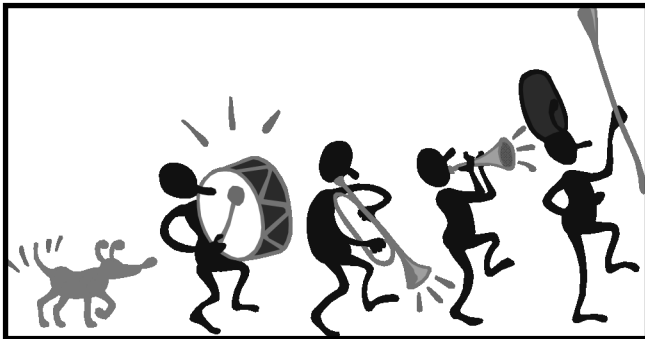

## Rocky Top Parade

The parade will be Friday, December 5, 2014 and the theme is "**Christmas in Rocky Top**". The parade will start at 7 p.m. and registration will be from 5 to 6:30 p.m. Please be aware that everyone participating in the parade must register, sign a release and receive a number regardless if you want to be judged or not. If you do not register and receive a number, you will be asked to leave the parade line.

If you are driving a classic or antique car in the parade, you will need to park at Lake City Internal Medicine. You will also *Parade* register at that location. Please back your car into one of the spaces provided while you are waiting for the parade to start.

Emergency vehicles will line up on Industrial Park Road. Industrial Park Road to Hustler Boat Lane will be closed at 5 p.m. until all parade participants leave the area.



If you plan on participating in the parade with an all terrain vehicle, the driver must be 16

years of age or older and you will register at the Lake City Middle School.

If you are sponsoring a float or a group, you must also register at the Lake City Middle School. Only one person representing the float has to fill out the registration but please be aware that you are releasing liability for everyone participating on your float. All floats and everyone participating with floats must be lined up behind the Middle School.

Anyone participating with a horse will also register at the Lake City Middle School. All horses must wear a horse diaper or you will not be eligible to participate in the parade.

Cash prizes will be awarded for first, second and third place in the float category and first and second place in the group category. Trophies will be awarded to the first and second place in the tractor, horse, antique car and hot rod car category.

## TAX RELIEF PROGRAM

The City of Rocky Top administers a state-funded Property Tax Relief Program to help elderly citizens pay their property taxes.

Property owners may be eligible to receive tax relief for the current tax year if they are 65 years old or older, must reside on the property and have a combined annual income of \$28,270 or less for the year 2013.

There are Tax Relief Programs for disabled homeowners and disabled veterans that do not have to meet the age requirements. The deadline for all tax relief applications is April 6, 2015. For additional questions or to discuss eligibility, contact Terry L. Jones at (865) 426-2838.

sickrooms, and as night lights. They provided meager illumination and so were seldom used for reading although a traveler, upon retiring to his room for the night, may well have used his miniature chamber lamp for that purpose. A frugal innkeeper, providing such a lamp for his guests, would have appreciated the small font or oil reservoir, which would have kept oil consumption to a minimum.

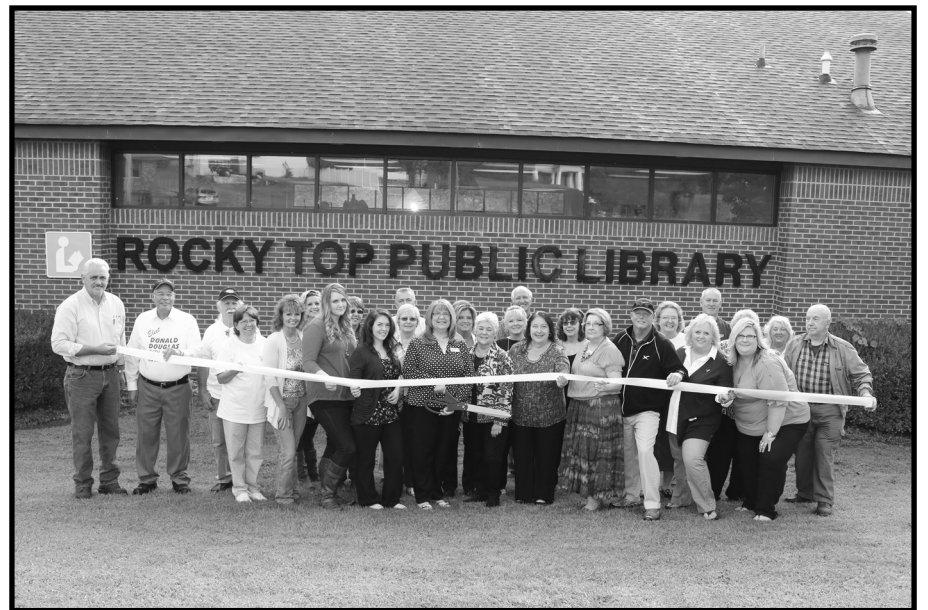

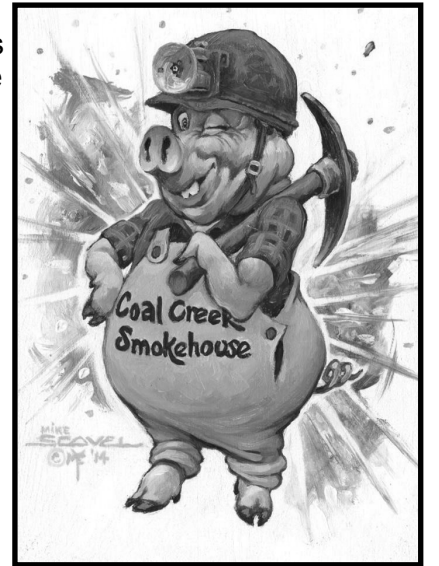

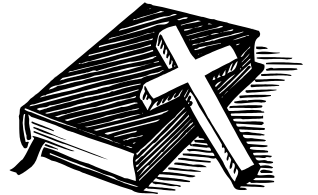

# Talking with CCC Recruit

One of my favorite things to do is listening to people's stories, family stories, historical accounts, fishing stories, funny or sad, long or short, it doesn't matter. Last February park rangers from Norris Dam and Big Ridge State Park had the opportunity to speak with a gentleman who enrolled in the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) and was stationed at CCC Camp 494/TVA 45, also known to many as Camp Sam. Claude Jenkins was very informative and enjoyed telling us about his time spent at TVA 45 as the men in the camp called it. It was a first-hand account that history books cannot capture; the life in his voice and the twinkle in his eye as he reminisced.

Mr. Jenkins chuckled and got a gleam in his eye when he talked about his friends in the CCC. Men would play pranks on the new recruits; of course they were not so funny when he was a new recruit himself. Mr. Jenkins became good friends with the baker and around 2:30/3:00 he would go and eat a fresh roll each day.



After his time with the Civilian Conservation Corps, Mr. Jenkins worked at Alcoa Aluminum Comp. Like many others he enlisted in the marines after Pearl Harbor and fought in the Pacific. After World War II Mr. Jenkins became an electrician and settled in Oak Ridge with his wife. Being in the CCC taught him a lot. It gave him a great start in life and an experience that he never forgot. He "learned how to get along with other people." He went onto say that he wished the youth of today could participate in a program similar to the CCC.

Sadly Mr. Claude Jenkins passed away in August of this year. As he enjoyed talking about the CCC and his time spent with them, I enjoyed listening to him. It was an honor to speak and listen to a "CCCer" and I learned more than facts. I learned how it changed the men and the opportunities it gave them. The "three C's" men like Mr. Jenkins were the pioneer conservationists who built many of our country's state and national parks. We owe them a great debt of gratitude for the untiring work upon our natural landscape and historical sites and monuments. Let us not forget them or the work that they did.

If you were in the CCC or know someone who was we would enjoy talking with them and learning as much as we can about the CCC or Camp CCC 494/TVA 45.

Mr. Jenkins grew up in southeast Tennessee. He moved from Polk to McMinn County and in 1940 enrolled in the CCC. He joined at age 19 because there were no jobs to be had. While at TVA 45 he was assigned to issuing uniform supplies to CCC recruits. He also delivered lunch to the men working in the field every day. All meals were served hot, even lunch; Mr. Jenkins and others would bring large pots and pans out to the work site to serve lunch. He said lunch at camp was better than lunch at home. In the field meant the work sites men were working at, either the fish hatchery below Norris Dam or the tree nursery at Eagle Bend. After the work day was over there were several activities he could participate in like playing pool, ping pong, checkers, ball, attend dances at the Rec Hall, or hitch hike to Clinton to the movie theater. He also took a typing class at the educational building. On weekends he and others would go to the horse stables located on the park and ride horses on the trails.

## RELAY FOR LIFE KICKOFF PARTY ON NOVEMBER 6<sup>TH</sup>

The 15<sup>th</sup> annual **Kickoff Party for the American Cancer Society Relay For Life for East Anderson County** will be held on Thursday evening, November 6<sup>th</sup> at 6:00 PM at Hoskins at 111 N. Main Street in Clinton. This event is open to the public, persons involved in the 2014 Relay For Life event, area cancer survivors, persons or businesses interested in becoming involved in the 2015 Relay For Life event. A dinner for donation will be provided by Hoskins including chili, hot dogs, vegetable soup, cornbread, banana pudding and beverages. Team awards will be given out from the 2014 Relay For Life event.

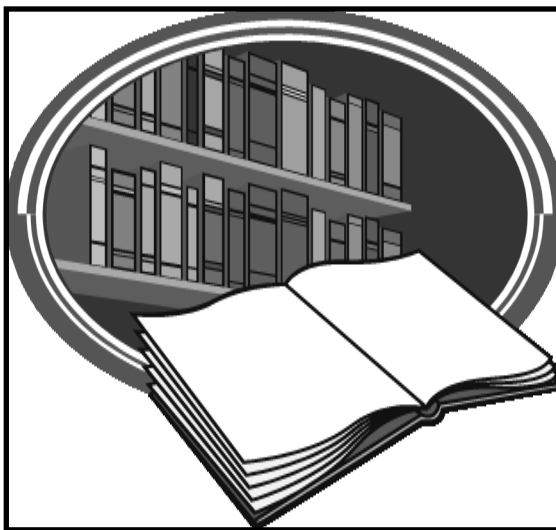

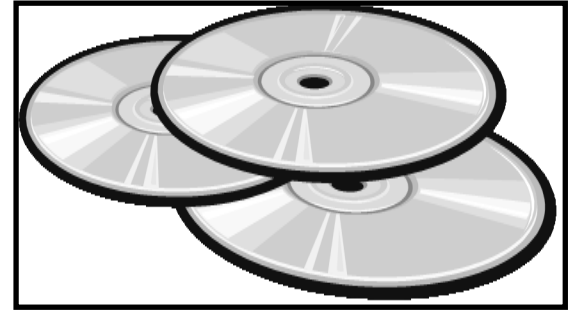
