Anderson County Football Team Goes From Making Plays To Making COVID-19 Shields

CLINTON, Tenn. (WATE) - The Anderson County High School football team started their practice at 7 a.m. Thursday. Right after, the Mavericks headed from the field to the workshop, working on another type of defense.

Community is a huge part of the Anderson County football program, and the Mavericks did their part by lending a helping hand. The team made plexiglass shields that will go into classrooms across the school district.

"We try and help out in anything going on," Mavericks coach David Gillum said, "and ya know what's going on here, in all communities in the country in the last 6 months has been rare. So, anything we can do to jump in and be a part and help is a big deal for our kids, and our community as a whole."

The team worked in an assembly line, building the shields from the ground up. Staff at the Anderson County Career and Technical Center acquired polyvinyl chloride, or PVC, pipes and plexiglass from a local hardware store. The

technical center team cut down the PVC pipes, prepping them to be assembled by the Mavericks.



ACCTC principal Robbie Herrell says the team's work was a huge help, as they churned out roughly 300 shields in a little over an hour.

The plexiglass shields will be used in schools to help combat coronavirus and limit the spread making a safer environment for teachers, staff and students as they prepare to go back to school Aug. 10.

Anderson County junior cornerback and wide receiver Garrison Terry says their work is not only important to help protect their fellow classmates but also the football season.

"It's important because we're getting back to our classrooms, make sure that everything is OK and that nobody's going to be hurt or get sick by this COVID and it'll really impact our season by everything that's going on around here," he said.

Aside from the speed of production, the Maverick's volunteer work also cut down costs, saving taxpayers some money. Herrell said preassembled plexiglass shields would cost \$30 each, but the manual work saves Anderson County Schools about \$22.



Gillum says they got the idea about assembling the shields through one of their assistant coaches that works at ACCTC and jumped in to help. The team not only helped out their community but also got some productive team-bonding in for a good cause.

"It was just a win-win for our kids to get the community service and at the same time good cause," Gillum said, "and it takes a lot of labor off their hands too."

REMINDER: Tax-Free Weekend in Tennessee

Don't forget that the first of two sales tax free weekends in Tennessee is underway right now.

It begins at 12:01 Friday, July 31st, and ends Sunday, August 2nd, at 11:59 pm. During this time, consumers may purchase clothing, school supplies, and computers and other qualifying electronic devices without paying sales tax. Certain price restrictions apply. For school supplies and clothing, the threshold for qualifying items is \$200 or less. For computers and other electronics, the price threshold is \$3,000 or less.

A first-of-its-kind second sales tax holiday will focus on restaurants next weekend. It begins at 12:01am on Friday, August 7th and ends Sunday, August 9th, at 11:59 pm.

Clothing

Exempt:

 General apparel that costs \$200 or less per item, such as shirts, pants, socks, shoes, dresses, etc.

Not exempt:

- Apparel items priced at more than \$200
- Items sold together, such as shoes, cannot be split up to stay beneath the \$200 maximum
- Items such as jewelry, handbags, or sports and recreational equipment

School Supplies

Exempt:

• School and art supplies with a purchase price of \$200 or less per item, such as binders, books, backpacks, crayons, paper, pens, pencils, and rulers, and art supplies such as glazes, clay, paints, drawing pads, and artist paintbrushes

Not exempt:

- School and art supplies individually priced at more than \$200
- Items that are normally sold together cannot be split up to stay beneath the \$200 maximum

Computers & Other Electronics

Exempt:

- Computers for personal use with a purchase price of \$3,000 or less
- Tablets, smart phones and electronic readers with a purchase price of \$3,000 or less
- Televisions and video game consoles with a purchase price of \$3,000 or less

Not exempt:

- Storage media, like flash drives and compact discs
- Individually purchased software
- Printer supplies
- Household appliances

Census Response Rate Data

The U.S. Census Bureau announced that it will begin emailing households in low-responding areas to encourage them to respond to the 2020 Census.

Millions of emails will be sent this week and then grow in numbers and continue into September. These emails supplement a final campaign reminding people to respond to the 2020 Census on their own, as census takers begin asking households to respond to the census.

The messages alert households in low-response areas that time is running out and their response to the 2020 Census is important for their communities. The email messages will invite people to respond online at www.2020census.gov. People who receive the email and haven't already responded should click on the link provided and complete the census online. It's easy, safe and important.

Nationwide, 62.7% of Americans had completed the Census, either by mail or online, as of July 28th. Tennessee's response rate comes in at 62.1%.

Anderson County's response rate has stayed strong at 66.2%, with Oak Ridge's rate of 69.1% leading among its cities. All five of the communities specifically identified by the Census Bureau in Anderson County have response rates above 50%. Clinton's rate is 68.2%, with Oliver Sprimgs at 63.3%, Norris at 63.1 and Rocky Top (still listed as 'Lake City') has a response rate of 50.5%.

Campbell County's response rate is a mediocre 52.5%, with Jacksboro continuing to lead the way with a response rate of 62.6%. Caryville's response rate is 52.6%, followed closely by LaFollette (52.4%) and Jellico (52.3%).

Roane County's Census response rate is 61.7%. 67.9% of Kingston residents have completed the survey, easily outpacing the 57% response rate in Rockwood, and Harriman's 55.1% rate.

56.9% of Morgan County residents have already responded to the Census. Among Morgan County communities, Oakdale has a response rate of 55.7%, while Wartburg comes in at 51.6% and Sunbright at only 48.7%.

The emails will go to all households that the Census Bureau has contact information for in census block groups with a response rate lower than 50%. This will include households who may have already responded. In total, the Census Bureau expects to email more than 20 million households in these low-responding areas.

The email messages will come from

2020census@subscriptions.census.gov, and will give recipients the option to opt out of receiving future messages. The Census Bureau is also considering sending text messages to areas that have low response.

Households have until October 31 to respond to the 2020 Census. However, census takers have begun following up with households that haven't responded yet in select areas and will begin following up with households nationwide in August.


