Officer Mitch Wade Receives TACP Officer of the Year Award

City of Rocky Top Police Officer, Mitch Wade, received the 2022 Tennessee Association of Chief of Police Officer of the Year Award. This award recognizes police officers that have demonstrated exceptional achievement and shown genuine

commitment in their profession, agency and community.

Wade demonstrated these attributes in multiple cases involving arson and theft.

Wade was instrumental in obtaining the evidence, conducting interviews and ultimately arresting the offenders.

One particular case spanned six months and involved the theft of multiple catalytic converters.

Local Veteran Receives Birthday Surprise

What started out as a simple Facebook request asking for birthday cards, quickly turned into an unexpected, but well deserved birthday celebration.

Kenneth Seiber was born and raised in Briceville, Tennessee and turned 99 years old on August 4th, 2022. Kenneth has received over 500 birthday cards, handwritten letters and beautiful drawings from as far away as Bangladesh after his daughter, Vickie Seiber posted a simple request on Facebook.

Her post read, "This is my daddy. His name is Kenneth Seiber. He is 98 and is a WWII veteran. He married my mother as soon as he came back from the war and they celebrated over seventy years together until she passed in 2020. He lost a brother in the war on June 4, 1944. Two days before the D Day invasion.

My father was in D-Day plus thirteen. He saw Hitler's wall of bones and liberated concentration camps. He cries when he remembers. He is a member of our Greatest Generation and my hero. He will celebrate his 99th birthday on August 4.

I would appreciate it if anyone that wants to, would send him a birthday card or note. I know it



National Public Lands Day

Each year thousands of people come together across the country to volunteer and work together in honor of National Public Lands Day as the largest single-day volunteer event in the United States.

National Public Lands Day was created in 1994 and is celebrated on the fourth Saturday in September each year, with the goal being to "restore and improve public lands around the country".

At Norris Dam State Park, volunteers can participate in National Public Lands Day and Tennessee Serves by participating in 2022's volunteer event, rerouting a section of trail known as Kerry's Revenge.

The goal of this project is to better improve the trail for sustainability and usage. The last several years rangers, other park staff, and volunteers have focused on improving several sections of trail across the park.

For this project, volunteers will be meeting at 9:00 AM, Saturday September 24th at the Tea Room. The Tea Room is located on the east side of the park off Highway 441.

Please make sure to bring lots of water, wear closed toed shoes, and bring snacks and lunch. This event is expected to last until 1:00 PM.

In 2019, Tennessee's First Lady launched Tennessee Serves "to encourage Tennesseans to serve one another and volunteer in their communities".

Each month, Tennessee Serves has a monthly challenge, and falling in with National Public Lands Day, September's challenge is serving Tennessee State Parks! These events might include trash pickup, trail work, cabin repairs, or removal of invasive species. September is National Childhood Obesity Awareness Month

September offers education and opportunities for families to prevent childhood obesity and to address the issue early.

Children who have obesity issues are more likely to have those same issues as adults. Addressing them at a young age prevents lifelong health issues such as diabetes, certain cancers, heart and sleep disorders.

Tennessee consistently ranks as one of the states with the highest rate of childhood obesity. According to KidCentralTN.com, about 20% of youth between the ages of 10 and 17 are obese in the state.

Many factors can impact childhood obesity. We think of the common factors like eating and physical activity, but other factors play a role as well. Those factors include genetics, home environment, social factors and metabolism.

Managing childhood obesity mainly starts at home but extends to the community. Parents and caregivers can encourage their children to eat



healthy and get physical activity in many ways:

- Make sure children get adequate sleep.
- · Limit daily screen time.
- Take part in regular physical activity as a family.
- Substitute higher nutrient, lower calorie foods, such as fruit and vegetables, in place of foods with added sugars and solid fats.
- Steer away from processed foods. Encourage whole-grains.
- Serve fruits and vegetables as snacks (a goal of 5 servings is ideal!).
- Serve water instead of sweetened beverages.
- Don't skip breakfast.



How to Prepare your Lawn for Cooler Weather

While fall brings in vibrant autumn colors, it also means you should prepare your lawn for the cooler weather ahead.

Luckily, prepping your yard does not need to require too much time or energy. Here are five tips from the experts:

- Adjust mower height Don't scalp warmseason grasses as cooler weather arrives.
 Raise the mower ½ to 1 inch during the fall.
 The reason behind this is to increase the leaf area of your grass. More leaf area capturing sunlight leads to more stored food as winter arrives.
- Remember to fertilize Fertilize your coolseason grass in the fall, usually in October or November. Those food stores help the grass survive winter and are responsible for a quick green-up in spring.
- Deal with weeds Get a jump on cool-season weeds, like dandelion. Treating weeds in the fall prevents seeds that dropped onto the lawn in early summer from sprouting. It will also help reduce the number of weeds you'll have next spring.



 Rake leaves – Stay on top of leaves through fall. Don't allow leaves to lay on your lawn for more than a few days. You want your grass to store heavy food

reserves and leaves will prevent the sunlight from allowing this to happen.

 Aerate – The best time to aerate grass is just before it enters its most active growth phase.
 For cool-season grass, its early fall. Aerate so that grass will have at least four weeks to recover and grow before the first frost arrives.

would make his day. He always asks me every day if he got any mail. His mailing address is P.O. Box 152 Rocky Top Tennessee 37769.

The outpouring of love didn't end with Kenneth receiving birthday cards. The community took it a step further and arranged for a drive by parade for this local hero. With the help of neighbors Terry and Lisa Abner and Brenda Bice, Kenneth was able to watch many cars, trucks, local fire departments, police departments, and rescue squads all pass by honking horns and proudly flying the American flag to wish Kenneth a happy birthday and show their gratitude for his service to our country.

Kenneth was wounded in battle after a bullet from German fire ricocheted off the ground and hit him in the back. His unit was still under German fire and Kenneth did not want an aid—car called into help him.

He continued to fight even though he was temporarily paralyzed. With the help of his fellow soldiers, he was able to be carried out and survived his injuries.

While deserving of a Purple Heart, there is no documented treatment from a medical officer, so Kenneth's family has reached a dead-end in trying to help Kenneth receive one. However, everyone that knows Kenneth, knows that he is a true hero.
